Northwestern Oklahoma State University's Department of Social Work helped celebrate Social Work Month in March with the theme ""Empowering Social Workers: Inspiring Action, Leading Change," a campaign that gives the public ways to support the profession in address our nation's challenges.

Social workers are people who enter the profession because they truly want to improve the lives of others and are uniquely qualified to handle complex societal issues. They go through years of education, training, and supervision so they can do the delicate, but important work of helping others achieve goals.

Social workers are trained to work in holistic ways, assisting not only individuals but families, organizations, communities, and even society at large. Social workers are employed everywhere - in hospitals, schools, local, state, and federal government, social service agencies, corporations, and veteran centers.

According to the Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS), social work is one of the fastest growing professions in the United States. It predicts nearly 800,000 people will work as social workers in the by 2032, an increase of seven percent over the decade. "Social workers have been behind many initiatives we continue to benefit from, including Social Security, a minimum wage, Medicare, and improved workforce safety," said Dr. Kylene Rehder, professor of social work and chair of the department of social work. "As our nation continues to face challenges, it is important that our society empower and support social workers so they can continue to help millions of Americans improve their lives." During Social Work Month and beyond, we can support the profession through legislation that increases social work salaries, improves social work safety, and promotes mental health services (adapted from the National Association of Social Workers, 2024).

Professional Development

The 2022 Educational Policies and Accreditation Standards of CSWE affirms and strengthens the enduring commitment of social work education to principles of anti-racism, diversity, equity, and inclusion (ADEI). CSWE continues to support social work programs in developing a workforce of social workers who are knowledgeable about the ways positionality, power, privilege, and difference affect practice areas, and how social workers challenge systems of oppression that affect diverse populations.

Wooden Children 2024

April is National Child Abuse Prevention Month! Members of the Northwestern Oklahoma State University Social Workers Association of Tomorrow (SWAT) have taken part in the "Wooden Children" project sponsored by The Care Campus.


The "Wooden Children" project is designed to bring awareness to the number of child abuse and neglect cases that are reported each year. In 2023, 271 confirmed cases of child abuse were reported in Garfield County, the number has increased from the previous year. The Care Campus, previously known as The Garfield County Child Advocacy Council, has conducted the Wooden Children Program annually for more than a decade. Each wooden figurine is approximately two to three feet high and was cut out by volunteers from the Garfield County community. Volunteers also painted on the faces and hair. Organizations, businesses, groups and individuals were asked to "foster" a wooden child for \$35. The group sponsoring the child dressed and displayed them. On April 5th the Wooden Children were taken to the courthouse lawn to be displayed for all of April, which is National Child Abuse Prevention Month. To volunteer with The Care Campus or become a Court Appointed Special Advocate (CASA) call 580-242-1153. Codi Harding, SWAT sponsor and assistant professor of social work, emphasized, "This initiative aims to increase awareness of the prevalence of child abuse and neglect within our communities. SWAT hopes this project will remind the community that we have a responsibility in safeguarding children. We also would like to remind the public, they are mandated reporters in the state of Oklahoma.



NASW-OK LEAD DAY



Northwestern Oklahoma State University Department of Social Work students and faculty joined social work students and practitioners from across the state in April at the Oklahoma Capitol for the 2024 National Association of Social Workers, Oklahoma Chapter (NASW-OK) Legislative Education and Advocacy Day (LEAD). Social work students and faculty from Oral Roberts University, East Central University, and the Anne & Henry Zarrow School of Social Work from The University of Oklahoma were also in attendance to learn about current legislation impacting the profession of social work and the populations they serve. The day started with a welcome message from NASW-OK Board President Stacey Blaylock and concluded with meetings with legislators. "Legislative Education and Advocacy Day provides an opportunity for participation in public policy issues and social justice advocacy, both key components of social work education and practice," Dr. Kylene Rehder, professor of social work and chair of the department of social work, said. Rehder said participating in LEAD provides an opportunity for social work students to engage in macro-level social work and learn effective ways to advocate for populations; as well as allowing students to understand how to access public policy and interact with their legislators.

Field Experience for Nine Social Work Seniors in Oklahoma & Kansas



Nine Northwestern Oklahoma State University senior social work majors began their field practicum assignments at agencies throughout Oklahoma and Kansas this spring semester. These students must complete 420 contact hours, demonstrate 20 behaviors and master the program's nine core competencies as outlined by the Council on Social Work Education (CSWE). Field Education is a signature pedagogy for social work that instructs and socializes students to the fundamental dimensions of professional practice. During field education, students are able to immerse themselves in practice and apply the skills and knowledge they have attained. "Each student in their field education is assigned to a field instructor who volunteers their time to assist in the education of students, as well as reinforce social work ideas, behaviors and competencies," Codi Harding, director of field experience and assistant professor of social work, said. "We appreciate all of our past and present field instructors."
