

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# Two faculty members earn doctorates

Two Northwestern faculty members, Taylor Randolph, assistant professor of psychology, and Mark Zadorozny, assistant professor of health and sports science, earned their doctoral degrees.

Randolph earned a Doctor of Philosophy degree in counselor education and supervision in May 2023 from Adams State University in Alamosa, Colorado.

His dissertation is titled "Counselor Referral Attitudes and Predictors of Sexual and Gender Minority CounPractice Jurisdiction" and is a continuation of research that was published

by McGeorge et al. (2016). According to his research, 62.7% of Licensed Marriage Family Therapists (LMFTs) identified they would refer a client to another person based on their sexual orientation. The American Counseling Association (2014) identified that LPCs cannot discriminate based



coun-(SGM) seling experience also significantly predicted SGM counseling competence.

"However, this finding was expected based on previous research. Counselors, counselorsin-training, and

counselor supervisors should work to increase competence for SGM clients as they face an increased risk of health, mental health, and quality of life disparities."

Randolph is a Phillips University graduate who earned a Master of Counseling Psychology degree from Northwestern and a Master of Theological Studies from Phillips Theological Seminary as well. Before joining Northwestern's full-time psychology faculty in 2016, he worked as a clini-Continued to page 4

cal director at Youth and Family Services in Enid. He has worked as a licensed counselor in Oklahoma since 2006 and worked in the mental health field since 2000. As a Northwestern assistant professor of psychology, he teaches courses in experimental psy-

chology, research methodology and overcoming child trauma.

Z a d o r o z n y earned a Doctor of Education degree in administration and leadership in May 2023 from Southern Nazarene University in Bethany.

His dissertation is titled

"A Case Study Exploring Teacher/ Coach Role Conflict in Rural Schools Through the Lens of Occupational Socialization Theory."

Zadorozny said the purpose of this study was to explore the challenges, barriers, and socialization factors involved when teaching in a core area and coaching at least one sport at one small, rural high school and one large, rural high school in the Central Southwest through a case study design. This research aimed to increase teacher/coach role conflict awareness among current and pre-service teachers/coaches, teacher education faculty, school administrators, and stakeholders.

"My study explored the impact of socialization factors and what successful strategies are necessary to minimize role conflict," Zadorozny said. "I examined the consequential influences on teaching/coaching orientations, motivations, and role pressures. Five central themes emerged based on the cross-case analysis of the participants in this study: challenging to balance multiple roles, difficulty with compartmentalizing roles, the need for time management, role am-

> bivalence, and role retreatism."

Zadorozny said his findings suggest that the multiple responsibilities and socialization factors involved in both roles can lead to teacher/coach role conflict resulting in role retreatism (where one role is prioritized at the expense of another).

Zadorozny is a Northwestern graduate who earned a Master of Education degree from Northwestern as well. Before joining Northwestern's full-time health and sports science faculty in 2020, he taught health and physical education, science, and technology at various grade levels (K-12) in both public schools and career tech settings for a combined 12 years. During that time, he also coached football, basketball, softball and baseball. As a Northwestern assistant professor of health and sports science, he teaches courses in technical teaching of rhythms and aquatics, adapted physical education and technical teaching of individual/dual sports.



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

### Northwestern adds new cybersecurity certificate

Northwestern's Mathematics and Computer Science Department launched a new cybersecurity certificate for students, working professionals and job seekers..

The certificate requires 24 hours of Computer Science classes and includes courses in Networking, Information Security, Hacking & Network Defense, Ethics, Data Modeling and Digital Forensics. The cybersecurity certificate is available via ITV at all campuses (Alva, Enid, Woodward and Ponca City).

"Over the last several years, we have tested student interest by offering courses in Digital Forensics, Information Security, and Cybersecurity," Dr. Tim Maharry, Department of Mathematics and Computer Science chair, said. "These courses attract large enrollments even though they are not required. Students routinely request more information and course offerings in this area of study."

Northwestern's application to the Oklahoma Regents for Higher Education stated the proposed cybersecurity certificate program will prepare students to take the industry certification exams in the Data, System, Network, and Cyber Security fields as well as the Digital Forensics field.

CyberSeek, a joint project between CompTIA, labor analysis firm Lightcast, and the National Initiative for Cybersecurity Education (NICE), shows that there are over 714,500 job postings in the United States requesting cybersecurity-related skills. Many of these openings are for dedicated cybersecurity positions such as cybersecurity analysts or penetration testers. CompTIA's State of the Tech Workforce report shows that demand in those areas will remain strong, with 4% growth expected in 2022 and growth that is expected to be 253% above the national rate over the next 10 years. According to Lightcast, the overall U.S. labor market is expected to grow by 1% in 2022 and 7.8% over the next 10 years.

"Computer Science is a rapidly changing field of study, and course content must be continually updated to reflect the needs of students entering the field," Mark Bagley, instructor of computer science, said. "Cybersecurity has become an area of great concern with billions of U.S. dollars stolen annually and national security at risk due to the looting of advanced technologies from U.S. companies and various governmental agencies.

"Students who earn our new cybersecurity certificate will have prepared themselves for entry-level positions as cyber security analysts. They will also be qualified to pursue additional certifications developed by the industry and our government."



### **Oswald becomes 'Get the Facts Out' Champion**

Dr. Jen Oswald, chair of the Division of Education and associate professor of education, is now one of more than 200 "Get the Facts Out" Champions across the United States.

Get the Facts Out is a National Science Foundation-funded partnership between the Colorado School of Mines and four national societies: American Physical Society, American Chemical Society, American Association of Physics Teachers, and the Association of Mathematics Teacher Educators, all working to repair the reputation of the teaching profession.

This unique project is designed to reach STEM majors in a large fraction of all U.S. mathematics, chemistry, and physics departments and has the potential to significantly address teacher shortages in these high-need STEM disciplines.

To be a Champion, all one needs to do is register at <u>https://getthefactsout.org</u> and start sharing facts about the teaching profession by using the materials and messages from the GFO project locally or nationally. Those interested in gaining a higher champion status can earn points by finishing a number of listed activities. Oswald has completed enough activities to be listed as a one-star champion.

"I think Dr. Oswald becoming a GFO (Get the Facts Out) champion is an exciting venture!" said Dr. Steve Maier, dean of faculty at Northwestern. "While GFO was originally designed to engage faculty in the STEM disciplines to recruit students into teacher preparation programs, GFO project leaders have always valued and welcomed teacher education faculty and professionals. This partnership not only demonstrates the collaborative nature of our divisions and departments here at NWOSU, but it also will help the national GFO program grow in new ways."

Maier, who served as the chair of the Department of Natural Science and a physics faculty member before taking on his current administrative role, also participates in this organization as a Physics Change Agent, which is described as an individual in their respective discipline who is committed to teacher preparation, is well-known in their discipline, and has agreed to conduct national campaigns to recruit and support GFO Champions at institutions across the U.S.

On the organization's website

are free customizable presentations for students and faculty, as well as posters, brochures, infographics, and teacher salary information from more than 100 regions across the country.

"I want to help recruit educators to the profession," Oswald said. "So many high schoolers have the drive and desire to become an educator but are discouraged from pursuing education as a career. By becoming a champion, I have access to resources and research to help me visit with high schoolers about education and the positive aspects of the profession there are many!"

As a Champion, Oswald said she plans to provide feedback from surveys during her own presentations to assist in research efforts.

Although GFO is focused mainly on math and science education, Oswald said she believes anyone with an interest in education would appreciate the research and resources made available to GFO Champions.





The activities extended outdoors with games and inflatables on the Woodward campus lawn. Classes included "Careers" by Taylor Phillips, Title III/LASSO Project career coach; "Education" by Dr. Jennifer Oswald, Division of Education chair; and two classes by Dr. Sierra Elsey, assistant professor of nursing, "Health Careers" and "Nursing."

Elsey said the event coordinators tried to think of ways to engage students on their level while helping them explore their career interests. For the healthcare careers stations and nursing-focused stations, they created hands-on experiences for the students to see the sciences and nursing come alive firsthand.

"We did a germ station, where we showed them the germs on their hands with a UV light before and after washing," Elsey said. "We used our manikin and allowed them to listen to lung sounds, heart sounds and taught them how to take blood pressure readings. We also taught them how to use an ace bandage to wrap ankles for basic injuries."

The event went beyond classroom simulations by involving the local Woodward EMS team to teach CPR to students, friends,

and family. CPR manikins were available for practice, enhancing the interactive nature of the event.

"Throughout the stations, I talked with the students about all of the healthcare career options, as well as the many options right here in northwest Oklahoma," Elsev said. "One of the best parts about the day was that it was multifaceted in the way that the intro to nursing students that I taught this summer led the stations. We had 10 student nurses present to lead our healthcare stations, four of them were student-athletes. The athletes came in uniform to demonstrate the many options that students have."




wife, Judith, now live in Tallahassee, Florida.

Savoy shared, "Fifty-plus Northwestern students, athletes, faculty, and staff as well as community supporters graciously shared a bit of their lives and history to the final product. More than half have passed and, sadly, at least six during the writing.







### **Oklahoma's Secretary of Ag visits Northwestern**

Blayne Arthur, Oklahoma's Secretary of Agriculture, was on campus in September to speak to students in agriculture classes. During her informal talk on agriculture and leadership, Arthur presented many helpful pieces of information.

She told those in Herod Hall Auditorium that an important thing she learned in her office during the height of the pandemic was that many people in the general population don't have a deep understanding of agricultural production, and a major effort should be made to intentionally engage consumers to educate them about how food is produced and delivered to the market.

She said people often don't like the idea of certain aspects of animal production such as large cattle feedlots and cages used in poultry production, but when food wasn't available during the pandemic, she and her office staff were able to have conversations with consumers about how the supply chain works within agriculture.

Arthur told students that, when she was younger, she never thought she'd be serving as the state's agricultural leader, and she felt that she was no different than students today who participate in agricultural organizations such as 4-H and FFA, and various other production agriculture endeavors.

She urged students to pursue and develop varied interests because it can help them get jobs after graduation. She also encouraged them to develop and utilize their personal networks to seek

internships

in

multiple areas of interest to explore occupations within the industry they could see themselves pursuing in the future.

When seeking employment, she said students should create resumes specifically tailored toward a desired position and include references who could speak directly toward their suitability in that area of interest. Also, and perhaps most importantly, she reminded the students to ask their references if they will provide positive information before listing them on a resume.

Arthur said that resumes showing a wide-ranging background in agricultural pursuits and good work experience go to the top of her list when she is considering job candidates. Students should also practice their inter-

viewing skills beforehand because communicating face-to-face with people and using correct grammar are often important keys to successful interviews.

She ended her talk by telling the students to lean into their education while at Northwestern and strive to become well-rounded individuals. She said that Northwestern professors, staff and administrators all desired to help students become successful, but that the students should embrace the initiative and recognize their responsibilities in their educational and occupational pursuits.

"Blayne has been personally involved with production agriculture throughout her entire life, which makes her uniquely talented in her role as Secretary of Agriculture," said Dr. Dean Scarbrough, Northwestern's agriculture department chair and professor of agriculture. "She has an inherent understanding of the complexities associated with the food supply chain and truly appreciates the struggles Oklahoma farmers and ranchers face every day. It is clear that she cares deeply about the state of Oklahoma and the young people who will make up the next

generation of agriculturalists."

Iack Stainstructor ats, of agriculture, and Scarbrough both expressed their thanks for Arthur coming to campus to share her love for the agriculture industry and her passion developing for instilling and leadership qualities in Oklahoma's young people.







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### Northwestern enters into agreement with Southwestern

Northwestern President Dr. Bo Hannaford and Southwestern (SWOSU) President Dr. Diana Lovell signed a partnership agreement recently to allow student passage for continuing education to each university.

Two SWOSU School of Nursing and Allied Health nursing graduates have been guaranteed placement into Northwestern's Wisdom Family Foundation Doctoral Program for Rural Nursing Practice (DNP) program. Also, part of the agreement guarantees two Northwestern chemistry majors' placements into SWOSU's pharmacy doctoral program.

Students were able to start these pathways beginning in fall 2024.

In 2021, Hannaford and Dr. Joel Kendall, provost at SWOSU, started the discussion of creating a pathway to give students opportunities between the two universities to complete degrees needed for Oklahoma's workforce. Dr. James Bell, vice president for academic affairs, finalized the partnership with Kendall. Northwestern's Dr. Steve Maier, dean of faculty, and Dr. Leslie Collins, chair of the Charles Morton Share Trust Division of Nursing, also helped with this agreement by working with Southwestern's Dr. Chad Kinder, vice president for strategic partnerships, Dr. Les Ramos, dean of pharmacy, Kendall and Bell.

"Northwestern is excited about partnering with SWOSU on this innovative program," Bell said. "We hope that it will be the first of many partnerships forged between undergraduate and graduate programs in the Regional University System of Oklahoma. We are stronger as a system when we work collectively."

Homecoming is a community effort, and the homecoming committee is grateful to everyone who made the week and official homecoming day a success.



## Art students display work at campus museum


Students enrolled in the 3D fundamentals course in the Northwestern Wisdom Family Foundation Visual Arts program created imitation trophy mounts, which were on display in the Museum of Natural History, located on the second floor of Jesse Dunn, through Oct. 19. A closing reception was held that day.

3D fundamentals is an introductory class, and this project is aimed at providing students with a creative opportunity to demonstrate their grasp of the fundamentals of threedimensional design. "In this project, students were tasked with creating sculptural objects inspired by the items on display as part of the Museum of Natural History's collection, and with an emphasis on creating entirely new animals rather than replicating existing ones," Thomas Cornell, assistant professor of visual arts, said.

To achieve this, each student engaged in a multi-step process, which included brainstorming ideas, sketching their concepts, considering the environment and habitat of their imagined animals, and finally, using cardboard and papier-mâché to bring their creations to life.

"This event provides an excellent opportunity for our student artists to showcase their work and discuss their creative processes with anyone interested," Cornell said.





### Oklahoma Council of Teachers of English fall conference held on campus

For the first time in history, the annual Oklahoma Council of Teachers of English (OKCTE) fall conference was held at Northwestern in Alva on Friday, Oct. 27, in the Student Center Ballroom. Other rooms in the Student Center were used for breakout sessions.

There were about 80 registered attendees.

The conference provided presentations, roundtables, and pedagogical workshops, the majority of which center on literacy and English Language Arts pedagogy and practice.

It offered area teachers and Northwestern faculty members an opportunity to present their research, attend professional development workshops, and network with other teachers and professors from around the state.

The conference's keynote speaker was Zhenya Yevtushenko, an Oklahoma poet and son of the celebrated Russian poet Yevgeny Yevtushenko.

At 7 years old, Yevtushenko first performed poetry to a crowd of hundreds at the Polytechnical Museum in Moscow with his father. As an adult, he has pivoted to a literary life. He is a published writer, and translator (Russian/English), with a modest background working in education.

He began translating his father's work in the mid-2000s. The young Yevtushenko's first published translation was featured in "The Guardian," a poem that reacts to the aftermath of the London Subway Bombings. He would continue to perform with his father widely in Russia at St. Petersburg's Philharmonic Hall, in the United States at the Library of Congress, and in public school classrooms in Tulsa.

He continued to perform with his father and served as one of his English language translators until the poet's death in 2017. Since then, he has been instrumental in managing his father's literary estate while sharpening his voice and skills as a writer, translator, performer and organizer. As an organizer, he is co-founder and representative of "Sunday Collective," a multi-disciplinary group of performers that promotes arts and outreach in Tulsa. He sits on the Living Arts Poetry Committee and was curating an event for March 2024. His creative work has been recently published in "The Tulsa Review," "eMerge Magazine," "Right Hand Pointing" and "Suburban Witchcraft Magazine."

OKCTE is an affiliate of the Na-

tional Council for Teachers of English.


"The students put this event together while still working on our other beginning of the year events, homecoming, pink week and our state campaign," White added. "I

"Other advisers commented that they liked having their students on a college campus and interacting with the NSA students," White said. "For some of them, it was the first time they had ever been on a college campus."





Attendees received a free t-shirt, free lunch in the Coronado Caf-


eteria, and free admission to the Northwestern football game against Southwestern Oklahoma State University. There were also inflatables and yard games for families to play.

Carr will receive funding for tu-







> "While Northwestern prides itself on the affordability of its nursing program, what truly sets it apart is the qual-





## Burlington, Alva advance to Regional BEST Robotics Contest in Denver

Students from Burlington High School and Alva High School advanced to the Regional BEST Robotics competition in Denver, Colorado, on Dec. 16-17 after earning top placings in the Heartland BEST 2023 "Incision Decision" contest at Northwestern-Alva Nov. 4.

Burlington earned first in the BEST Award category, the third consecutive year for Burlington to win this category. Dr. Tim Maharry, director of the Heartland BEST competition and chair of the mathematics and computer science department, noted that the BEST award includes a marketing presentation, spirit and sportsmanship, an engineering notebook, a team exhibit, as well as robot performance.

Alva's robotics team earned the top Robot Game Award.

These students competed against other teams from Colorado, Kansas, Ohio, Pennsylvania and South Dakota.

Other winners in the BEST overall category were Lawton Academy of Arts & Science, second; Arnett High School, third; and Waynoka High School, fourth. mathematics and computer science department. "The game competition was very competitive with several teams in the running throughout the semifinals and finals. In the finals, the top two teams were very close, with Alva winning with 1,015 points in the finals followed closely in second by Leedey with 1,000 points."

This year the students' robots were created to score points by assisting in various surgical tasks including brain biopsy, cardiac valve repair, coronary artery bypass, cardiac ablation, pacemaker electrode connection, arterial plaque removal and cardiac angioplasty.

This year marks the 21st year that Northwestern has held a BEST competition. BEST stands for Boosting Engineering, Science & Technology.

At the <u>regional event in Denver</u>, Alva Robotics earned an award for Most Robust Machine and Trevor Hankey of Burlington High School was named as a finalist for the Kendrick Castillo Memorial Outstanding Student.

tor, and professor of social work, said. **"CWPEP** at Northwestern has graduated 22 students. result-

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


Dash Johnson, '19, played for the Northwestern Ranger baseball team and graduated with both his bachelor's and master's degree.



## Northwestern enters into agreement with Redlands Community College

Northwestern President Dr. Bo Hannaford and Redlands Community College President Jenna Marr signed a partnership agreement recently to allow Redlands nursing students to seamlessly continue their education at the university.

Graduates of Redland's nursing program will be given credit at Northwestern for specific courses already taken, totaling 48 credit hours.

A total of six credit hours will be waived upon Redlands students' arrival to Northwestern.

Redlands nursing students will be allowed to enroll concurrently in six credit hours in the Northwestern Division of Nursing courses while completing the nursing program at Redlands.

Students will be able to start these pathways beginning in Spring 2024.

"This is a wonderful opportunity for our students to continue their education," Marr said. "This partnership with Northwestern is another step in our effort to meet the healthcare demand, particularly in rural and tribal areas of the state."

"Northwestern is proud to partner with RCC and I am excited about future program collaborations," Dr. Hannaford said. "We value this partnership and are excited to offer nursing students

this opportunity."
