# OK-LSAMP Opens Doors: Student Explores STEM in France, Spain

Ko Brooks, a senior biology major from Alva attending Northwestern, was selected to participate in an international STEM experience through the Oklahoma-Louis Stokes Alliance for Minority Participation (OK-LSAMP) program.

Brooks joined 15 other students from universities across Oklahoma on an academic trip to France and Spain from May 25 to June 1. The week-long journey included visits to some of the world's most iconic landmarks, such as the Eiffel Tower, the Louvre, and the Palace of Versailles, as well as guided tours of the Gothic Quarter in Barcelona and the Sagrada Familia. Students also participated in university and industry site visits related to STEM fields.

"My favorite part of the trip was getting to visit the Louvre," Brooks said. "Getting to see the Mona Lisa, Venus de Milo, and other iconic paintings and statues felt surreal. Additionally, most students on this trip were complete strangers to each other. But we all bonded quickly, and I made new friends that I now couldn't imagine the trip without."

The OK-LSAMP program, led by Oklahoma State University and funded by the National Science Foundation (NSF), aims to increase the number of underrepresented students earning degrees in science, technology, engineering and mathematics. Fourteen four-year universities across the state, including Northwestern, are part of the alliance.

"I've been the OK-LSAMP-STEM campus coordinator at Northwestern since 2002," said Dr. Tim Maharry, professor of mathematics and chair of the mathematics and computer science department. "Approximately four to eight students each year receive scholarships and other support through the program. It benefits students by providing scholarships as well as funding for research and attending conferences and seminars. Students can continue in the program beyond Northwestern if they pursue graduate degrees in STEM fields."

Brooks said the flights, tours and two group meals were paid for by OK-LSAMP.

"I had never imagined I would get this opportunity, Brooks said. "I knew the program had many research and travel opportunities, but nothing like this trip."

Brooks encourages other eligible students to partici

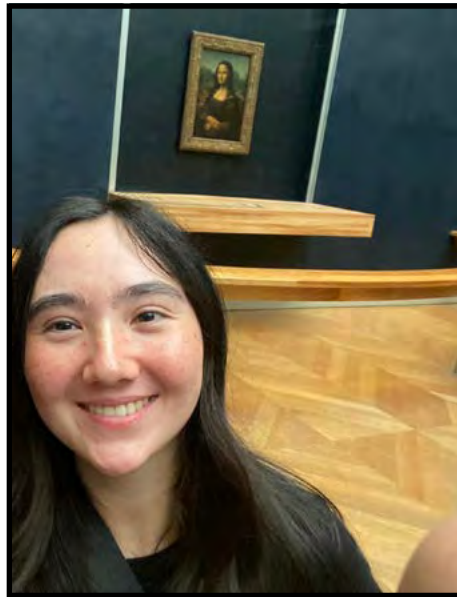
pate in the program.

“OK-LSAMP offers many research opportunities, both nationally and internationally, and travel opportunities such as this trip,” Brooks added. “Another major part of the program is supporting students who are seeking to go on to graduate school. Monthly meetings focus on helping students apply and transition into graduate school.”

Brooks, who is actively involved in the program, said this international experience exceeded her expectations and credits Maharry for making her aware of this scholarship opportunity.

# Report shows economic impact of Northwestern

In partnership with the Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education (OSRHE) and the University of Cincinnati Economics Center, data was provided to show the economic impact of Northwestern Oklahoma State University on the economies it supports.

The operations expenditures made by Northwestern, as well as the spending of students and alumni, generate economic impacts in the form of economic output, jobs, and wages throughout the State of Oklahoma. These expenditures, in turn, stimulate additional economic impact resulting from increased demand, income, and jobs within other industries as well as increases in household income and spending. The subsequent impact on state and

local tax revenue represents the fiscal impact. This result is comprised of the income tax revenue resulting from the wages supported as well as the sales tax revenue resulting from student spending and the spending of wages.

The report highlights the following:

- Northwestern generated a total of \$124.08 million in economic output and supported a total of 1,204 jobs with wages of \$55.45 million in the State of Oklahoma in fiscal year 2024.

- The operations, student spending, and alumni of Northwestern created a total of \$3.75 million in fiscal benefits for state

and local jurisdictions in fiscal year 2024, which is comprised of \$2.01 million in income tax revenue and \$1.74 million in sales tax revenue.

- Every dollar in state appropriations Northwestern received in fiscal year 2024 resulted in \$12.36 in total economic output in the State of Oklahoma.

“We know we give students a great education and experience at an affordable cost, but seeing numbers on how Northwestern impacts our communities and the State of Oklahoma gives us another reason to be proud of the work we are doing,” President Bo Hannaford said.

# 14 DNP students complete 2025 summer residency training

Fourteen students in the Wisdom Family Foundation Doctoral Program for Rural Nursing Practice at Northwestern spent five days on the Alva campus for residency week in July.

The students are involved in a hybrid program meaning that much of their education is completed online. The students can complete clinical work in their hometowns while Northwestern faculty members supervise remotely. For residency week, the students come to the Alva campus for a week of hands-on training and to show that they are competent in physically assessing patients.

Students who attended this year's week-long residency program included Teresa Austin of Mooreland, Dipal Bhakta of Tulsa, Payton Bills of Yukon, Jordan Bourland of Colgate, Cassandra Denoya of Ponca City, Shirley Font of Yukon, Sydney Hamill of Anthony (Kansas), Sarah Maldonado of Monkey Island, Caitlin Nagel of Garber, Heather Patton of Stigler, Mollie Hughes of Tulsa, Caley Sharp of Ponca City, Ifeoma Uduezue of Edmond and Elizabeth Wright of Durant.

During residency week, students are able to check off their physical assessment skills to prepare for a clinical setting. They receive an introductory experience to common procedures they will encounter in primary care such as suturing, eye injuries and biopsies. Kiowa Meat Locker donated pig feet to practice suturing and cattle eyeballs for assessing eye injuries, and Moore's Venture Foods in Alva donated overripe produce for biopsy simulation.

Dr. Gwyneth Holderby, assis-

tant professor of nursing and Wisdom Family Foundation Doctoral Program for Rural Nursing Practice program director, was joined by assistant professors of nursing Dr. Angela Skousen, Dr. Hannah Hoppes, Dr. Krystal Elliot and Dr. Sierra Eley to provide instruction to the group during the week. Together they supervised physical exams that were completed on community volunteers and taught the students procedures like joint injections, repairing lacerations with sutures, and other procedures commonly performed in primary care.

Holderby also met with students to discuss their DNP projects and clinical placement.

"It was a great week," Holderby said. "The faculty and students really got to bond with each other and grow their relationships. The students checked off on head to toe exams so they are ready to start clinicals in the spring and learned many skills they will need for practice. We had so many amazing volunteers from the community as well."

The BSN-to-DNP program enrolled its first class in August 2017. The sixth class to have graduated did so this year in May. Members of the graduating class of 2025 presented their respective projects in the J.W. Martin Library on July 17 in an

event open to the public.

Northwestern is one of five public universities in Oklahoma to offer a Family Nurse Practitioner program, was the first public university with a BSN-to-DNP offering, and is the only program in the state with an emphasis on nursing in rural communities. So far, the program boasts a 95 percent or better certification pass rate and a 100 percent employment rate.

Students may enroll full-time for the three-year program or part-time for the four-year program. Instruction within this program helps

## Northwestern launches updated Media and Communication Degree

The Mass Communication program debuted as Media and Communication this fall.

“This title is a better representation of our academic program as it encompasses mass media and strategic communication,” said Tamara Brown, communication department chair and assistant professor of speech.

Faculty spent many hours researching to determine what changes needed to be made to this long-standing, well-known program and how to make them.

“We reviewed years of exit surveys that had been completed by graduating seniors of the Northwestern Mass Communication program,” Brown said. “We discussed options previously considered for program changes, researched other university programs and discussed current industry trends with communication professionals.”

The updated curriculum is designed to enhance alignment with evolving industry standards, a priority for the program. The primary modifications to the degree requirements for major and major/minor programs include updates to previous courses as well as some new classes to replace outdated coursework.

New classes required for the degree include: Writing for Media Professionals, a lower level writing course to address the basics of writing in all areas and to serve as a prerequisite to prepare students for all upper-level writing courses; and the 4000-level course Social Media Strategy, a course to address how to incorporate social media platforms in a comprehensive communication plan, including use of analytics to

gauge effectiveness.

Students continue to participate in award-winning student media the Northwestern News newspaper and NWTv7 broadcast, the student-led strategic communication firm Ranger Communication and are provided the opportunity to utilize the program’s podcast recording studio.

Students are also afforded career enrichment opportunities such as media tours with corporate and non-profit communication teams, TV stations, marketing and advertising firms, and newspapers in the region. Previous tours included discussions with communication professionals—including Northwestern alumni—from the Love’s Corporation; KOCO-TV in Oklahoma City; the Paycom Center; event and entertainment venue Texas Live!; and The Oklahoman.

“The students are able to learn from various professionals, network and visualize the ‘big picture’ of how they may fit into the industry, which is so important for future success,” said Dr. Jesse Schroeder, assistant professor of communication and NWTv7 adviser.

New elective classes will also be available in the major/minor program including Media Literacy, Advanced Reporting, and Special Topics in Communication. Students

will still receive top-tier instruction in broadcast, journalism, strategic communication, and related areas.

These changes were approved by the Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education during the spring 2025 semester.

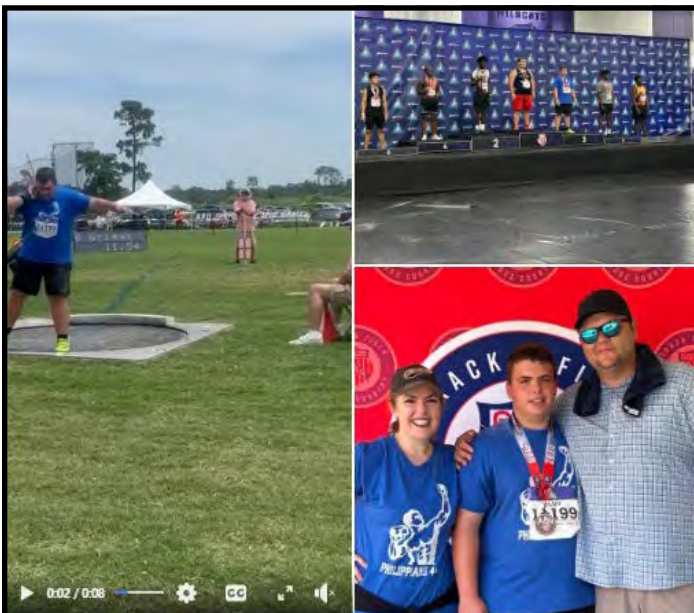

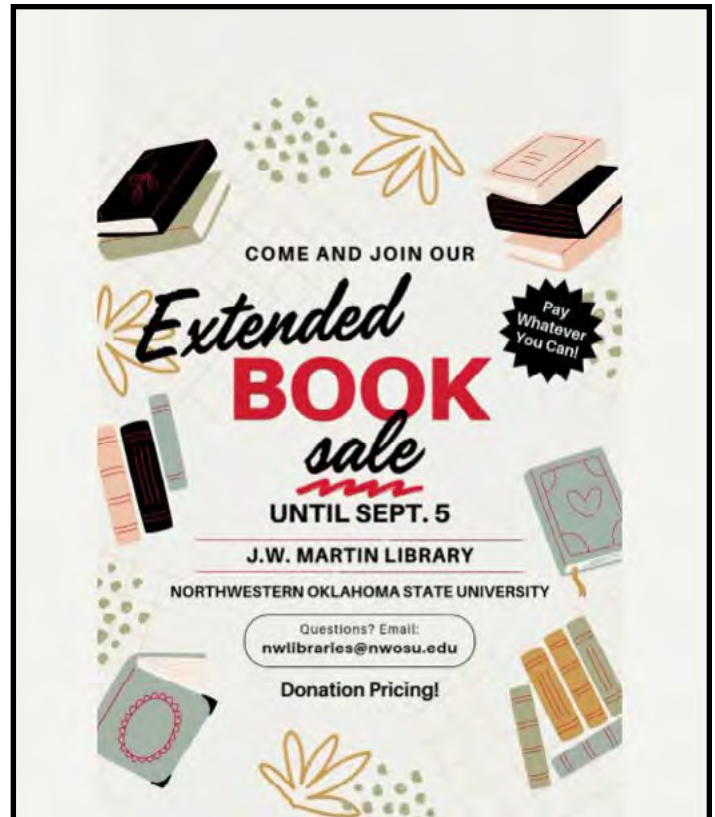

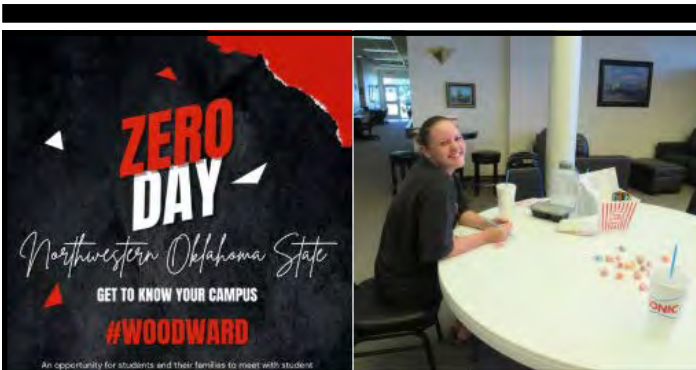

# Longtime Northwestern employees promoted

Northwestern officials have announced the promotion of two longtime Rangers, Brad Franz and Calleb Mosburg. Franz has been named vice president for athletics, moving from his role as director of athletics. Mosburg has been named vice president for student services and enrollment management, previously serving as dean for student services and enrollment management.

## Brad Franz

Franz is entering his 10th year leading the Ranger athletic department and 19th overall. Under his direction, the program has maintained stability and steady progress in all sports since the university's transition from the NAIA to NCAA Division II.

Ranger athletic teams excel academically, posting an athletic department GPA of 3.21 for the 2024-2025 school year, which marked the 18th semester in the past decade above a 3.0 GPA. In 2024-2025, 127 student-athletes earned D2 Athletic Directors Association All-Academic honors, requiring a minimum 3.5 GPA, which ranked number one in the Great American Conference.

Franz has also been instrumental in expanding athletic opportunities. In 2019, he launched the women's track and field program, now boasting 56 members under nationally recognized coach Jill Lancaster. In 2023, he initiated the men's track and field program which also has 56 members.

His leadership has resulted in facility improvements, including overseeing the renovation of Percefull Fieldhouse, a new 20-stall horse

barn for the rodeo team, and the completion of the Dunning Performance Center renovation. He spearheaded the physical creation of the Ranger Hall of Fame in Percefull Fieldhouse and helped secure the funding for the Verne Metcalf family university track.

Franz was named the Donovan Reichenberger Fundraising Award winner in both 2018 and 2022. Before becoming athletic director, he served as head men's basketball coach during the 2015-16 season,

leading the team to its first Great American Conference tournament appearance. Franz previously served as vice president for instruction at Otero College in La Junta, Colorado, and as vice president of student services and enrollment management at Northwestern from 2006 to 2013.

Along with an extensive history with Northwestern, he also earned his bachelor's and master's degrees from the university. Franz has three children — Jordan, married to Kylie; Cecely, and Aleysa, married to Dalton Rose — and is a proud grandfather to Emma and Jimmer, with another grandchild on the way.

## Calleb Mosburg

Mosburg began his career at Northwestern in 2007 in the Office of Recruitment, where he helped produce some of the largest freshman classes in school history. His success led to promotions in 2008 to retention coordinator and assistant director of recruitment. In these roles, he continued to drive freshman enrollment growth.

In 2010, Mosburg became director of financial aid, implementing practices to make the process more efficient and student-friendly. He guided the office and students through a smooth transition during major federal loan program changes.

Three years later, he was named dean of student services and enrollment management. In this role, Mosburg has advanced enrollment growth by institutionalizing Complete College America and Higher Learning Commission strategies, increasing concurrent high school enrollment by 104%, and establishing the Enrollment Management Task Force. His efforts have contributed to three consecutive years of 4% enrollment growth. He has also prioritized campus safety with infrastructure and procedural improvements.

Through the many positions Calleb has held at Northwestern, the one constant has been his love for serving students and being a part of each one's journey as a Ranger.

Mosburg serves in the Alva community on the Woods County Election Board, the Alva Airport Commission, and as a deacon at the First Baptist Church. He also volunteers his time coaching youth softball and assisting in many other volunteer activities.

# New Ranger statue unveiled at Ranger Field

Northwestern proudly unveiled its newest campus landmark thanks to the generosity of Liz Smith, Jeff Allen and Woody Glass. The public dedication took place on Aug. 23 at 6 p.m. at the entrance to Ranger Field.

The bronze figure, crafted to embody the spirit and strength of the Rangers, is positioned to greet fans as they arrive for football and baseball games.

This Ranger statue is the third installment, with one located on the northeast corner of the Alva campus, along with one at the Northwestern-Enid location. The original Alva statue was a gift to Northwestern from past university president Tom McDaniel and wife, Brenda, with Harold Holden as the artist. A dedication ceremony for the first Alva statue took place in November 2007.

In February 2008 during the dedication ceremony at the Enid location, Holden said, "The structure will symbolize

the qualities of the cowboy: honesty, hard work and courage." The Northwestern-Enid statue was donated by Harold Hamm and his former wife, Sue Ann.

The lead donation came from Liz Smith, wife of the late Alva optometrist Dr. Troy Smith, whose passion exuded when it came to supporting the university. The Smiths chaired Northwestern's annual scholarship drive for 25 years and served the Northwestern Foundation and Alumni Association in other capacities. Troy Smith started at the Alva Vision Clinic in 1981 and was proud to serve his northwest Oklahoma clients, said Liz Smith.

When Liz Smith learned that another statue was still in storage, she knew this would be the best way to honor her late husband. While the three statues were being cast, the couple traveled to the workshop to watch the process. Liz said her hus-

band loved building anything from tables to decks, and was really fascinated with the work on the statues.

The Smiths both graduated from Northwestern in 1976, Liz Smith with a business administration degree and Troy Smith with a biology degree. Jeff Allen, a former member of the Ranger baseball team, earned a business administration degree in 1987, and longtime friend of the university Woody Glass, a former member of the Ranger football team, attended Northwestern from 1986-1989.

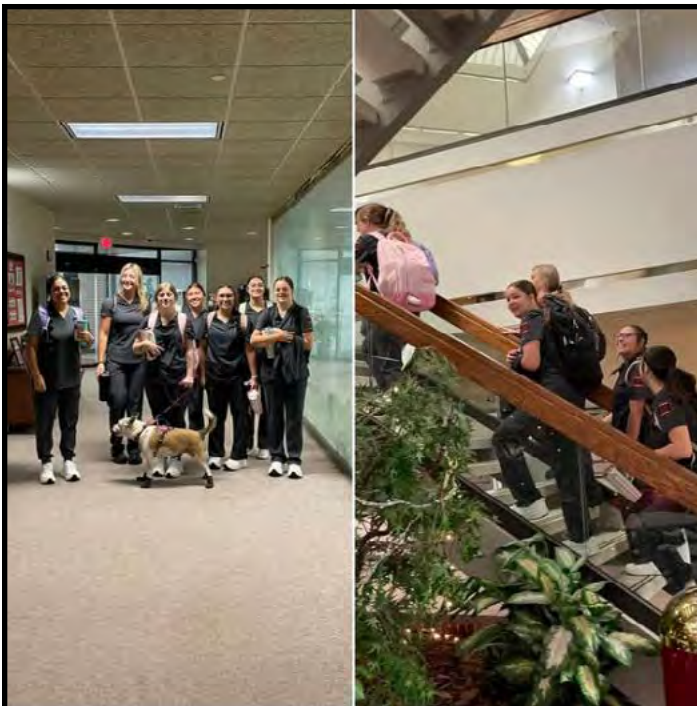

The statue now stands near Ranger Field, serving as a bold symbol of school pride and tradition.

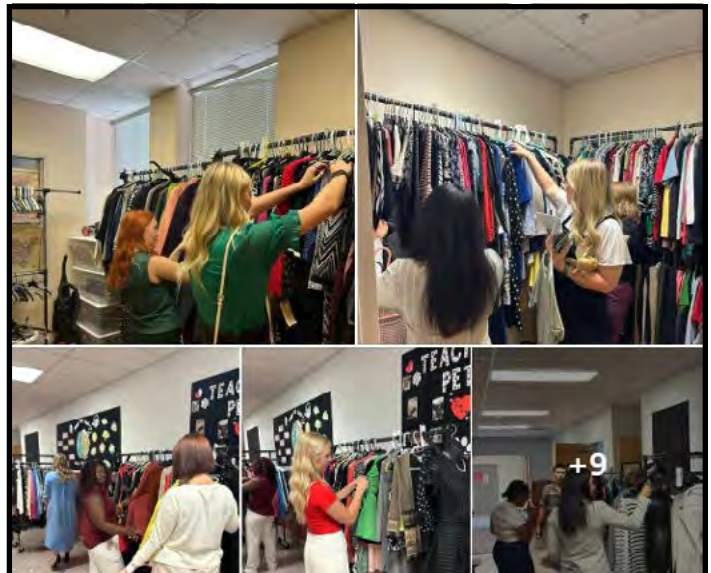

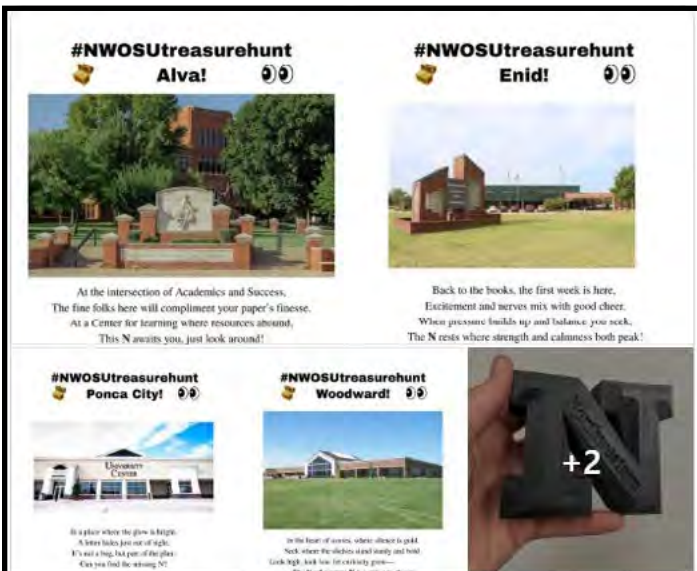

# Moreira continues traditional fall piano recital September 9

The Reichenberger Department of Fine Arts at Northwestern Oklahoma State University will showcase world-class faculty talent when Dr. Eduardo Moreira performs a free piano recital Sept. 9.

Moreira, assistant professor of music, will continue his tradition of offering a solo piano recital in Fellers Family Auditorium in Herod Hall on Sept. 9 at 7 p.m. Doors will open at 6:30 p.m.

“This concert is a chance for Northwestern students to witness a music professor perform as a professional musician and an opportunity for those who enjoy classical music on the piano,” Moreira said.

The program features all four ballades by Chopin, Berg’s Sonata Op. 1, three etudes by Rachmaninoff and concludes with Prokofiev’s Seventh Sonata.

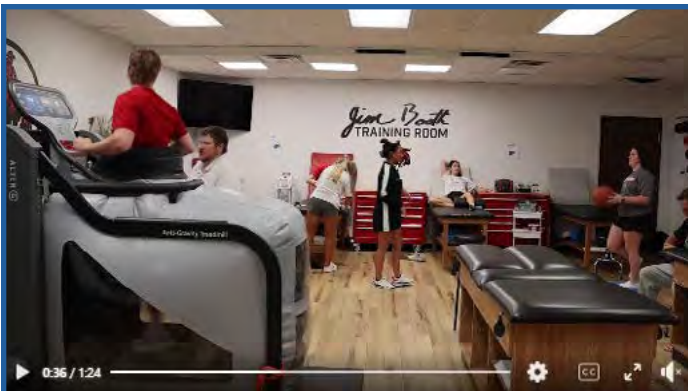

The 2025-2026 Northwest Oklahoma Concert Series season opened with a matinee performance in September at Fellers Family Auditorium in Herod Hall at Northwestern Oklahoma State University in Alva.

World-class opera singers Brooklyn Snow, soprano, and Matt Greenblatt, tenor, from Nashville, Tennessee, presented selections from famous operas and musical theatre songs. They were accompanied by Northwestern assistant professor of music and concert pianist Dr. Eduardo Moreira.

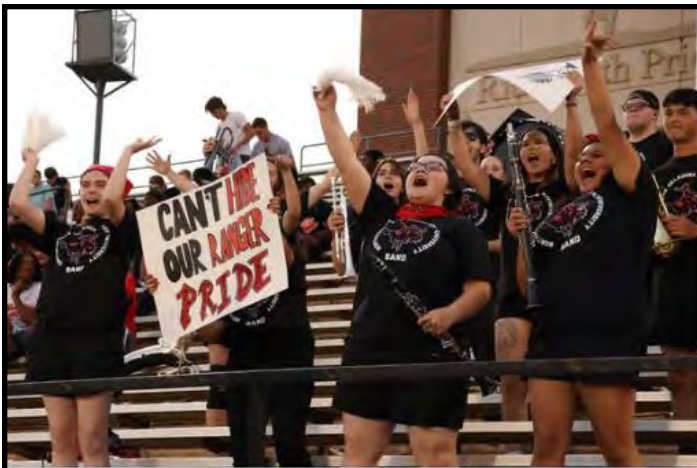

Elayna Warrington was selected this past summer to be a participant in the Fort Worth Zoo Conservation Expedition. Warrington is a junior at Northwestern.

The Fort Worth Zoo works in collaboration with its in-country partners, the National Parks Trust of the Virgin Islands, who lead the Anegada Rock Iguana Conservation program. Warrington was one of 30 students in the country to be selected. The expedition took place on Anegada Island, one of the British Virgin Islands. While on the island, she played a direct role in conservation research of the Anegada Rock Iguana (*Cyclura pinguis iguana*), a critically endangered species.

The seven-day expedition was filled with learning opportunities, including radio tracking, conducting surveys, field researching and more. Warrington and the other students spent each day soaking in the knowledge they learned and helping do their part in conservation.

The island is now home to many invasive species including feral cats, free-ranging cattle and goats. These animals are hindering the growth of the iguana population. This makes the research more important.

"We would set up cameras to see if the iguanas were frequenting specific areas and record their behaviors," said Warrington.

Warrington assisted at The Anegada Rock Iguana Head Start Facility. This facility houses young hatchlings that are fed and protected until they are old enough to not fall prey to the feral cats and other animals.

"Being able to see a critically endangered species and the program that is working to protect what remains of the iguanas was really special to me."

Warrington is pursuing her degree in natural history biology. She is set to graduate fall 2026. In the meantime, she plans to continue to work in other conservation and wildlife programs.

"This trip confirmed that I want to continue to follow my childhood dream of working in conservation."

This year's topic was "Presidential Pardons: A Closer Look at a Second Chance."

Co-Founders and Co-Executive Directors of the Northwestern Institute for Citizenship Studies Dr. Aaron Mason, professor of political science, and Dr. Eric Schmaltz, Northwestern Social Sciences department chair and professor of history and global studies, explored the constitutional authority of the Executive Branch to grant pardons,

commute sentences and otherwise lessen or eliminate issues of guilt and punishment. The program also examined how the public views this unique presidential power and highlighted notable historical examples of its use.

Following the presentation, the audience was invited to join in an open discussion and Q&A session. Attendees were encouraged to bring questions to help spark a robust exchange of ideas. Free snacks and beverages were provided.

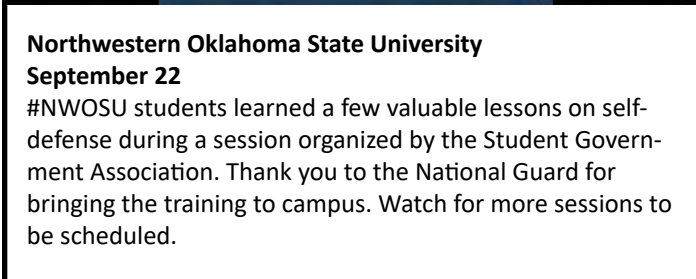

“Adams Elementary and the Enid community are fortunate to

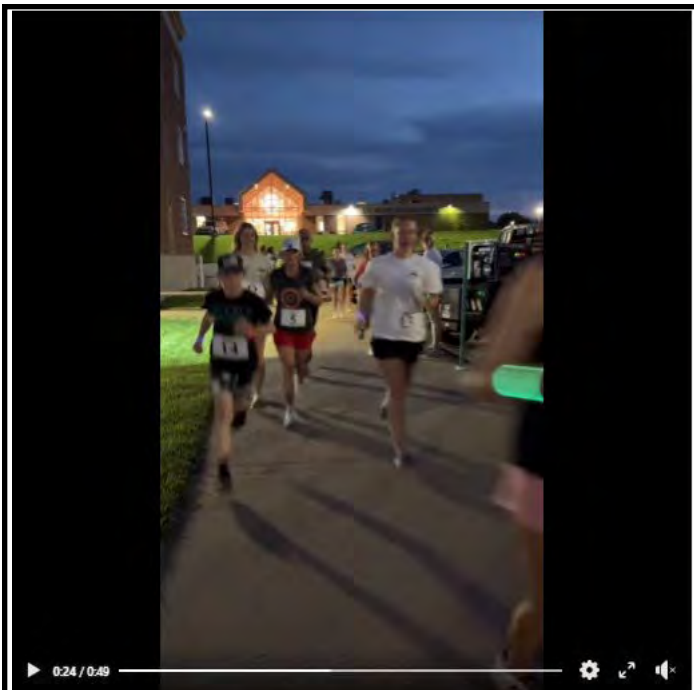

## Infant, Early Childhood Mental Health micro-credential is successful

The Infant and Early Childhood Mental Health micro-credential program facilitated by Northwestern's Department of Social Work is proving to be a successful program.

Designed to equip social service professionals and students with the knowledge and skills to support young children's mental health and development, the program has seen 27 professionals successfully complete the micro-credential with an additional 25 currently enrolled as of September 2025.

"The growing demand for this micro-credential reflects a rising awareness of the vital role early mental health plays in lifelong development," said Dr. Kylene Rehder, Northwestern Department of Social Work chair and program director of the Infant & Early Childhood Mental Health Training Academy. "By equipping professionals with specialized knowledge in infant and early childhood mental health, we are responding to a critical workforce need and empowering individuals to make a meaningful, lasting impact on the lives of young children and families across our state."

Developed by Northwestern's Department of Social Work with guidance from Oklahoma Human Services and Western Plains Youth and Family Services, the program emphasizes the critical importance of nurturing parent-infant relationships and promoting secure attachments.

Participants must complete one three-credit-hour course in Infant and Early Childhood Mental Health and six clock hours of approved training in the field. This curriculum offers a comprehensive foundation and is delivered by social work faculty, alongside leaders in early childhood mental health. Courses and trainings are available both in-person and via distance education, offering flexibility to accommodate diverse student needs.

A limited number of scholarships are available through the Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education's Workforce Micro-Credentials and Rapid Re-Employment Initiative. These scholarships are designed to support eligible students pursuing this credential and entering a high-demand field.

Micro-credentials serve as a

valuable form of certification, allowing professionals to demonstrate specialized skills and advance their careers through continuing education. The micro-credential is designed specifically for social service professionals seeking to deepen their expertise in infant and early childhood mental health.

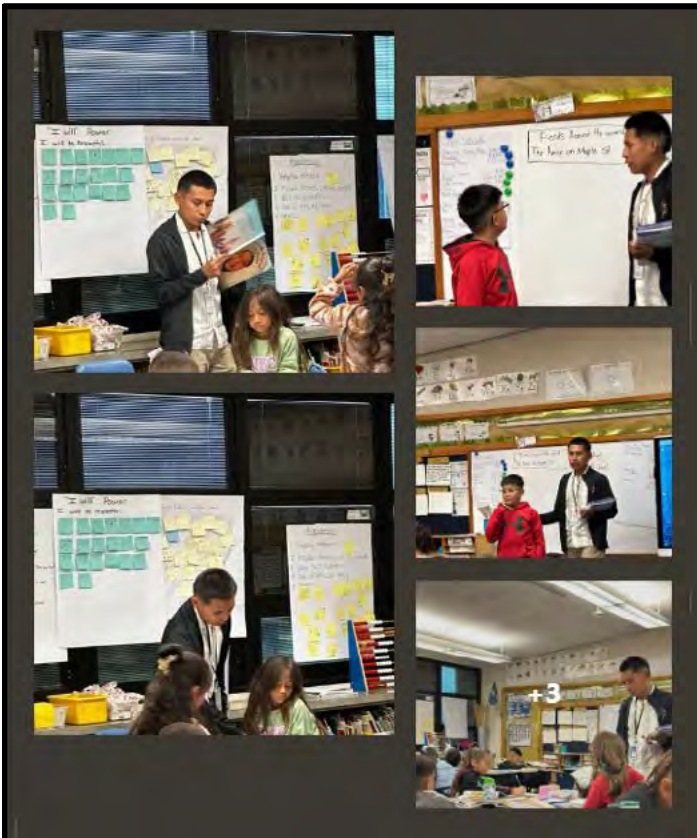

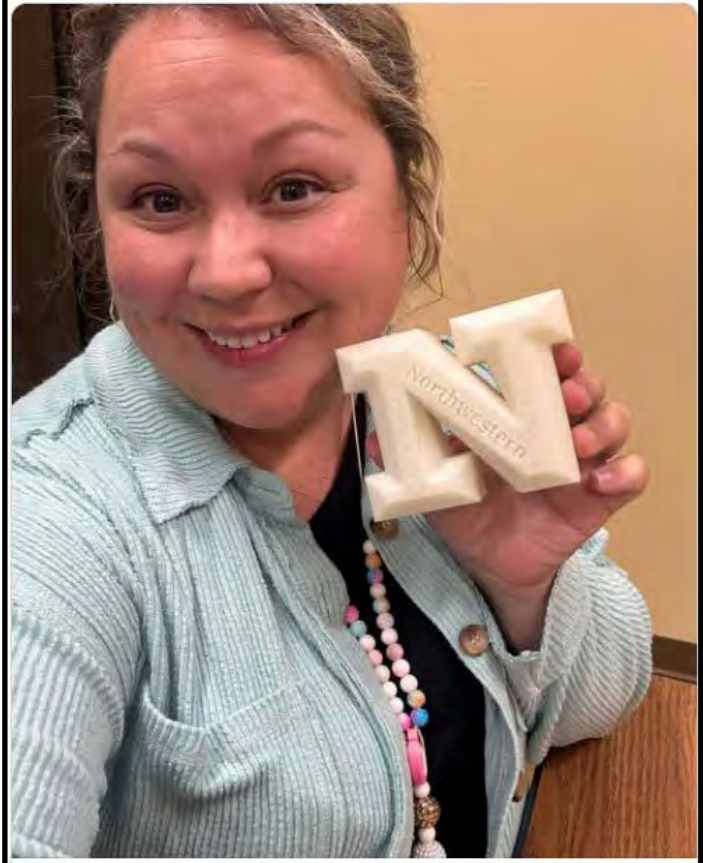

# Northwestern sees four-year enrollment increase

Northwestern officials announced an increase in enrollment for the fall 2025 semester. Currently, there are 2,152 students enrolled as Rangers, which is a 3.41 percent increase. Credit hours have increased by 2.55 percent.

Almost every category of enrollment has seen an increase. The most notable increases are in concurrent high school enrollment, with a more than 20 percent increase, and transfer enrollment, with an increase of more than 30 percent, compared to Fall of 2024. The Wisdom Family Foundation Doctoral Program for Rural Nursing Practice (DNP) also saw an over 30 percent enrollment increase.

Since 2021, the universities' en-

rollment has increased more than 20 percent. Strategic enrollment initiatives and collective efforts have led to this progress over the past four years, explained Calleb

Mosburg, vice president for student services and enrollment management.

“We are always encouraged to see growth in our student enrollment,” Dr. Bo Hannaford, university president, said. “This progress reflects the hard work and commitment of our faculty and staff. It is truly a campus-wide effort, and we are excited to welcome these new Rangers into our community.”

Hannaford is also proud that nearly 60 percent of Northwestern undergraduate students graduate debt-free.

### CHILD WELFARE PROFESSIONAL ENHANCEMENT PROGRAM (CWPEP)

**EXPERIENCE THE CHALLENGE OF CHILD WELFARE SOCIAL WORK**

The Child Welfare Professional Enhancement Program (CWPEP) offers students the opportunity to make a commitment to serve Oklahoma families and children at risk of abuse and/or neglect. Applications are available to undergraduate social work majors who are U.S. citizens or legal permanent residents of the U.S. This program is led by the Oklahoma Department of Human Services (ODHS), Children and Family Services Division, through its Title IV-E of the Social Security Act.

**WISDOM-FAMILY FOUNDATION PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT OPPORTUNITIES**

Presented by the University of Oklahoma Anne and Henry Zarrow School of Social Work, the Child Welfare Professional Enhancement Program is also able to refer students to other professional development programs, including The University of Oklahoma, East Central University, Oral Roberts University, and Northeastern Oklahoma State University, at MSW, LSW and WSP/MSW. These programs and the CWPEP programs in both the state and Texas allow students to qualify as an opportunity for social work majors who are currently in public child welfare. Students who are accepted to any of these programs, certain CWPEP students up to the total amount of that year's contract number of children work centers.

**CHILD WELFARE PROFESSIONAL ENHANCEMENT PROGRAM**

Students receive 12 to 18 credit hours in the CWPEP program, including general education and general education courses.

**STUDENT REQUIREMENTS**

Students accepted into the program receive monthly stipends or payment is made for tuition, certain fees and expenses. Students sign legally binding contracts that require an employment obligation to ODHS/CF of one calendar year for each academic year of financial assistance or to repay the money expended. Child Welfare employees agree to maintain their employment with ODHS.

**MONTHLY FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE**

Students accepted into the program receive monthly stipends or payment is made for tuition, certain fees and expenses. Students sign legally binding contracts that require an employment obligation to ODHS/CF of one calendar year for each academic year of financial assistance or to repay the money expended. Child Welfare employees agree to maintain their employment with ODHS.

**STUDENT REQUIREMENTS**

Students accepted into the Child Welfare Professional Enhancement Program are required to take child welfare related courses, attend the ODHS CORE Training Program and to have field placements in ODHS Child Welfare centers. Upon completion of the Bachelor Degree, social workers must obtain employment as Child Welfare Specialist.

**CAREER OPPORTUNITIES WITH THE OKLAHOMA DEPARTMENT OF HUMAN SERVICES**

Oklahoma Department of Human Services (ODHS) offers Child Welfare career opportunities throughout the state of Oklahoma. ODHS works actively to assist BSW and MSW graduates in finding employment. CWPEP is available to both current and former employees of the state who have a Title IV-E agreement with ODHS. Field placements are required to work in either a public Child Welfare program upon graduation.

## ***Inaugural Reichenberger Legacy Scholar Program Applications Open***

Northwestern students will be able to step out of the classroom and learn about American historical locations in person this spring.

Applications were open in October for the inaugural Donovan Reichenberger Legacy Scholar program. This program will provide students with real-world exposure to ideas and concepts covered in traditional classroom study via travel and first-hand experience at historic locations.

All full-time Northwestern undergraduate and graduate students are eligible to apply; no concurrent students are eligible, and applicants must be at least 18 years old.

The first session of the program is titled Ancient America: Exploring America's Pre-Columbian History. Students will consider the rise and fall of ancient American Indian civilizations by first learning about and then visiting sites such as Spiro Mounds Archaeological Center in eastern Oklahoma and Cahokia Mounds near St. Louis, Missouri.

Students will study the complexity and accomplishments of ancient American Indian societies and consider why they eventually ceased to exist. Students will gain an appreciation for the idea of conservation of historic and cultural resources and study the politics associated with the preservation of these sites.

"We are very proud and excited to announce the inauguration of the Donovan Reichenberger Legacy Scholar Program," said Dr. Aaron Mason, Northwestern professor of political science. "This program will provide an innovative and groundbreaking opportunity for Northwestern students."

Donovan Reichenberger was born in Andale, Kansas, in 1927. He served in the United States Navy from 1945 to 1963, a Veteran of World War II and the Korean Conflict. He married Dorothy Reichenberger on June 6, 1958.

After his completion of military service, he earned his bachelor's degree from Northwestern in 1966, and a master's degree from Wichita State University in 1967. That same year he joined the Northwestern faculty, but his commitment to the university extended far beyond the classroom.

During his tenure, he would serve as Northwestern's Faculty Representative for the Oklahoma Intercollegiate Conference from 1975 until his retirement in December 1992. Upon his retirement, he served as the Chairman of the Centennial Steering Committee and aided in the formation of plans for Northwestern's 100th Anniversary.

In 1996, he and his wife created the Donovan Reichenberger Chair in History. This gift provided non-appropriated funds to benefit Northwestern's history program. This gift, as well as many other contributions to the university over the years, continues to support and nurture the Northwestern Department of Social Sciences.

"We are eager to honor and recognize our generous benefactor for his many gifts to the university and secure his legacy," said Dr. Eric Schmaltz, Northwestern Department of Social Sciences chair and professor of history.

The program will consist of two components. First, students will familiarize themselves with the chosen historical topic outside of a

classroom situation. This step began this fall and involved students reviewing online resources, reading required texts, and meeting with faculty to discuss the topic.

Students completed these requirements to be eligible for the second component. Northwestern Social Science Department faculty members overseeing the program would determine student performance at this point.

The second program component will involve travel to the sites of study in Spring 2026. This stage involves students agreeing to make the trip and comply with all university and departmental protocols during the trip.

Upon returning from the trip, students will be required to write a final assignment on a topic designated by the faculty organizers. Upon successful completion of the program, students will earn designation as Donovan Reichenberger Legacy Scholars and receive a certificate to that effect. Students will be able to incorporate this distinction into their resumes, assisting them in future academic endeavors for graduate school or employment.

In the process, the program showcases Northwestern's role in making possible such activities outside of the classroom, while recognizing the Reichenbergers' generous legacy, both to Northwestern and the wider community.

"I get to see all the applicants, and Hadley is one of the top applicants," he said. "She's an impressive student."

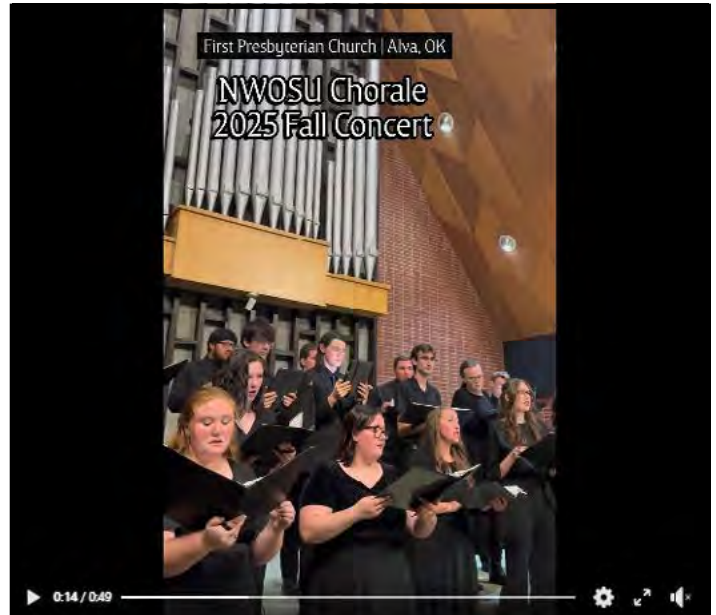

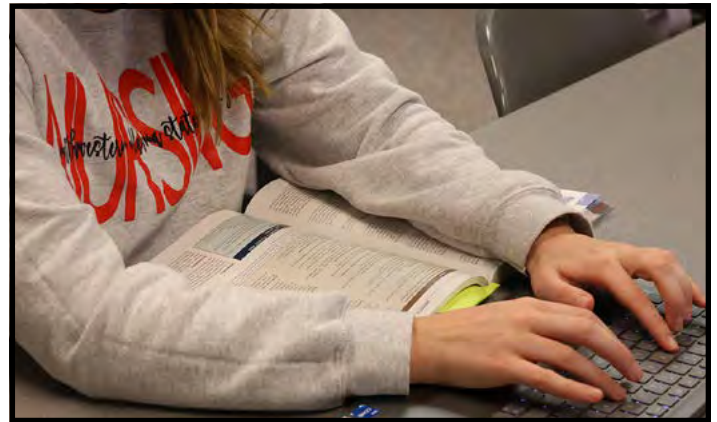

He also handles maintenance and operations of the historic Runnymede in downtown Alva. These countless volunteer hours

earned him the Volunteer of the Year award from the Alva Chamber of Commerce in 2017.

Some of Brown’s favorite memories around the Northwestern Homecoming activities are from the parade itself, making his selection as parade marshal a full-circle moment. He has assisted the Miss Cinderella candidates at the Runnymede for several years and looks back fondly at bringing his kids to the parades in years past.

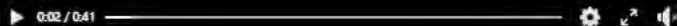

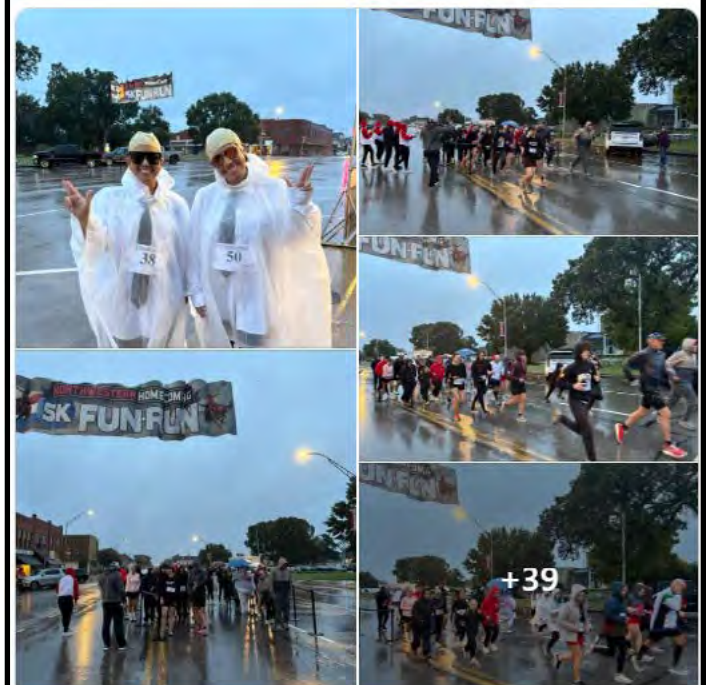

# Heartland BEST Robotics Competition held November 1

Eight teams were scheduled to compete in the 23rd annual Heartland BEST Robotics competition at Northwestern's Alva campus on Saturday, Nov. 1, from in Percefull Fieldhouse.

The high schools and middle schools scheduled to compete include Alva Robotics, Arnett High School and middle school, Burlington High School, Elgin High School, Lawton

Academy, MIGHT Community Development Team from Lawton, and Persimmon Creek Robotics, comprised of students from the Mutual, Sharon and Vici areas.

BEST co-director Dr. Tim Maharry, chair of the Mathematics and Computer Science department and professor of mathematics, who also serves as the head of sponsorship and finance and the BEST Award, said that the teams have been designing and building their robots over the past eight weeks. All teams start with an identical kit of parts.

Teams score points by completing various tasks in the game field. This year's game was "Factoids" and has a dan AI theme.

Each team competed in six preliminary matches, with the top teams advancing to the finals. The top three winning teams from Heartland BEST advanced to the regional competition in Wichita, Kansas, on Dec. 6-7.

BEST stands for boosting engineering science and technology. BEST is a national robotics competition that started in 1993. Heartland BEST in Alva started in 2002.

Also serving as co-directors for Heartland BEST are Dr. Mary Riegel, professor of mathematics, who also serves as the game committee chair, and Dr. Jenny Sattler, chair of the Department of Natural Sciences and professor of physics, who also serves as

tee chair.

Others on the committee include other Northwestern faculty, Alva community members and the families of committee members, including Dr. Adam Alber, assistant professor of chemistry; Dr. Roxie James, chair of the English, Foreign Language and Humanities department and associate professor of English; Dr. Keenan Meeker, assistant professor of mathematics; Dr. Jason Wickham, professor of chemistry; Evan Vaverka, instructor of computer science; and Dave Riegel, Sandy Riegel, Dena Riegel, and Kaylynn Samples.

# Ranger Rodeo held Oct. 30-Nov. 1 at fairgrounds

The Northwestern Rodeo Team played host to its annual Ranger Rodeo on Thursday, Oct. 30, through Saturday, Nov. 1, at the Woods County Fairgrounds Arena.

Twenty schools from the National Intercollegiate Rodeo Association (NIRA) Central Plains Region with more than 450 students competed for the top prize in each event.

“We were so excited to host our home rodeo here for another year,” said Northwestern Rodeo head coach Cali Griffin. “It’s a great chance for us to bring over 450 contestants and their families into our community to see what Alva has to offer, and we love the opportunity to show the community what we’ve been working so hard for, and compete in front of our home crowd.”

Thursday was “Student Night” with all Northwestern students being admitted free of charge by showing a current student ID; Friday was Family Night/Calf Scramble for Kids; and Saturday was the Match of Champions.

On Friday night, teams of two men and two women from various rodeo teams entered into a foot race with the winners taking home \$100. Each team member had to be in western attire with boots and hat and had to go down and back the length of the arena.

Slack, or overflow contestants, took place on Thursday at 2 p.m. for barrel racing with timed-events following on Friday and Saturday at 9 a.m.

On Saturday night during the Match of Champions, winners of the aggregate in the breakaway roping, steer wrestling and team roping went head-to-head against former

Northwestern Rodeo standouts and National Finals Rodeo qualifiers Taylor Munsell, World Champion Jacob Edler and Shannon Frascht for the chance to win a \$500 bonus. The matches were held immediately following each event.

Before the home rodeo, Northwestern Rodeo was on track to have another successful season, having participated in three rodeos so far this semester: Colby Community College, Southeastern Oklahoma State University and Oklahoma State University.

The Northwestern women’s team sat at fourth place in the Central Plains standings after a Reserve Championship finish at Stillwater; the men’s team currently was at sixth in the standings.

Four Northwestern Rangers had found the winner’s circle so far this semester:

Kyler Altmiller, a senior agriculture major from Canadian, Texas, started off the Ranger’s rodeo season with a team roping title at Colby’s rodeo, partnering with Oklahoma Panhandle State University rodeo team member Porter Hall.

Emmett Edler, assistant rodeo coach and graduate student from State Center, Iowa, claimed the steer wrestling title at Southeastern’s rodeo.

Savannah Greenfield, a junior health and sports science education

major from Lakeview, Oregon, won the barrel racing title, and Nathan Duvall, a junior agriculture major from Henryetta, won the steer wrestling title at Oklahoma State’s rodeo.

Duvall leads the Central Plains steer wrestling standings with 315 points earned this semester. Kendyll Miller, a freshman agriculture major from Hennessey, led the breakaway standings with 206 points.

“We were very excited to host

## Campus Cabinet contest established as Day of Kindness project

In association with the Nov. 14 Day of Kindness in Northwest Oklahoma event that Northwestern and area communities participate in, a project to benefit the university's Campus Cabinet Food Pantries in Alva, Enid and Woodward was held.

All three of Northwestern's campuses participated in campus-wide food drives for their respective campus locations through Nov. 14.

The contest for the groups collecting the most pounds of food and other necessary products was open to various organizations, clubs, athletic teams, academic departments and programs, individual classes, groups of friends, and more.

Groups participating in the contest had to register their intentions to participate in both the Day of Kindness event and the food drive. Groups had to explain how they planned to collect their donations.

Prizes were awarded to the group bringing in the most pounds of products.

The Campus Cabinet Food Pantry set a goal to collect 1,000 pounds of product.

Angelia Case, coordinator of the Campus Cabinet on the Alva campus, explained that with about five weeks left in the fall semester, a weekly average of more than 156 pounds of food is being distributed from the Alva pantry, with some weeks seeing higher distributions than others. The Alva pantry is also spending an average of \$759 a month this semester to purchase items to keep the pantry stocked for university students and employees in need.

"We wanted to be helpful to our friends at the Enid and Woodward

Campus Cabinets as well," Case said. "Their needs may be a bit different from ours in Alva, but we hope they were able to add items to their campus food pantries by way of this campus-wide food drive, too."

Case said that at the conclusion of the drive, the various groups at the Alva campus that registered scheduled a time with her to take their collections to the pantry location in Shockley Hall.

Needs are similar but different at each campus pantry. In Alva, the pantry welcomes many different shelf-stable foods, as well as personal hygiene items, sheets, pillows, coats, gloves and school supplies.

Items most needed at the Enid and Woodward campuses include canned soups/pastas and other individual meals, powdered milk, fruit cups, peanut butter/cheese crackers, hygiene products plus diapers.

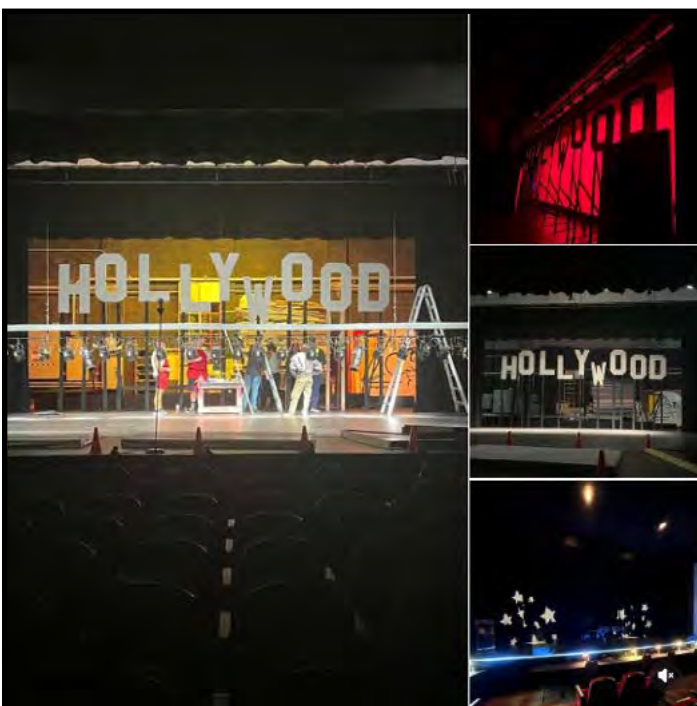

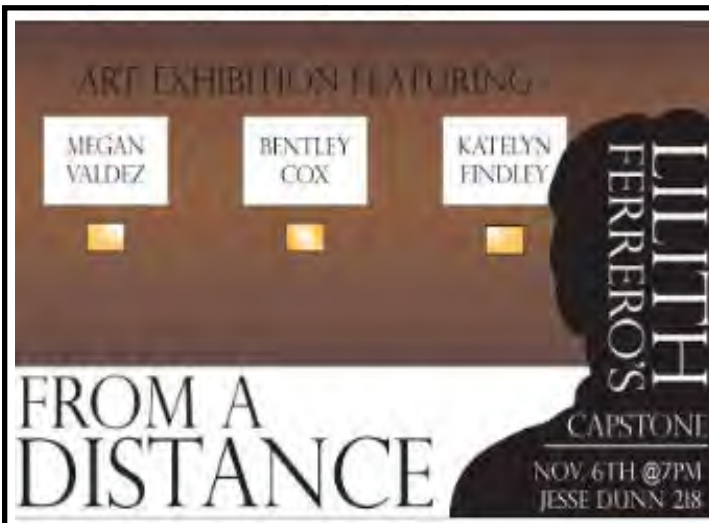

## ***Burlington advances to 5th straight BEST Regional Robotics Championship***

Burlington High School captured first place in the BEST Award category during the Heartland BEST robotics competition Oct. 31-Nov. 1 marking its fifth consecutive win and advancement to the regional championship, held this year in Wichita, Kansas, Dec. 6-7.

Joining Burlington in Wichita to compete for the BEST Award is Arnett High School, which returns to regionals after advancing last year. Arnett Junior High, in its first time competing independently from the high school team, also advances to regionals to compete in the game component.

Teams competed against other teams from Colorado, Kansas, Ohio, Pennsylvania and South Dakota, as well as Oklahoma teams from the OKBest hub in Oklahoma City.

Locally, the first- and second-place BEST Award winners—Burlington and Arnett High Schools—automatically qualified for regionals, along with the top Robot Game finisher not already advancing, Arnett Junior High.

The BEST Award, locally and at regionals, combines five components: engineering notebook, marketing presentation, team exhibit and interview, spirit and sportsmanship, and robot performance. The weighted average scores determine the overall winners.

All advancing teams can also compete for special awards like T-shirt design, most photogenic robot, or the Founders Award for Creative Design.

All BEST teams received identical kits of parts to design and build their robots over the past eight weeks. This year's game, Factoids, featured an artificial intelligence

theme that challenged teams to complete a series of field tasks.

**BEST Spirit and Sportsmanship Award:** Burlington High School

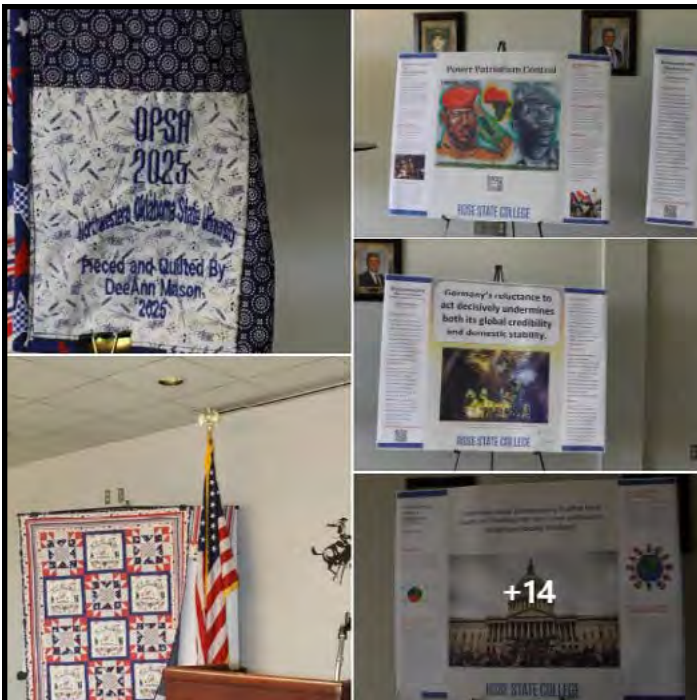

## Cast brings nursery rhymes to life ‘Hard Boiled: A Nursery Crime’

Children of all ages, plus adults, were welcomed to attend the public performance of the Northwestern theatre production for young audiences, “Hard Boiled: A Nursery Crime” by Tracy Wells in Fellers Family Auditorium in Herod Hall in Alva on Saturday, Nov. 22

The production, produced by special arrangement with Pioneer Drama Service in Denver, Colorado.

Classes from local and area elementary schools attend the production on Thursday and Friday, prior.

Kimberly Weast, chair of the Department of Fine Arts, professor of theatre arts, and director of the children’s play, said there are several people in the cast for this production, where audience members saw that people don’t have to be “eggs-perts” to love this series of nursery rhyme-inspired vignettes that offered incredibly flexible casting and minimal props and sets.

## Enid campus awarded TSET grant

Northwestern’s Enid campus has been awarded a Built Environment Grant from the Tobacco Settlement Endowment Trust (TSET) to fund the Enid Campus Recreation Area project. The \$25,000 grant is matched by an additional \$25,000 from Northwestern.

Awarded in June 2025, the grant is funding new lighting along the walkway connecting the Northwestern and Northern Oklahoma College Enid campuses to enhance safety. The public-access walkway is ADA-compliant and frequently used by students and community members.

The grant has also funded a new gazebo along the walkway and 10 new disc golf pads to expand the existing nine-hole course and practice area.

When completed at the end of 2025, the project will enhance outdoor recreation opportunities on campus and provide a safer, more accessible space for family-friendly activities.

“This TSET grant will help make our campus more accessible and increase opportunities to promote wellness,” said Dr. Wayne McMillin, dean of the Enid campus. “The pathway is both a symbolic and practical reminder of our Bridge program with NOC. It connects our campuses and supports our shared commitment to higher education in the Enid community.

“The gazebo will offer a resting spot and gathering place for students, staff and community members, while also serving as a shelter for disc golfers. The new lighting improves safety for those using the walkway in the evening. This was a much-needed project, and we are very thankful for TSET’s support.”

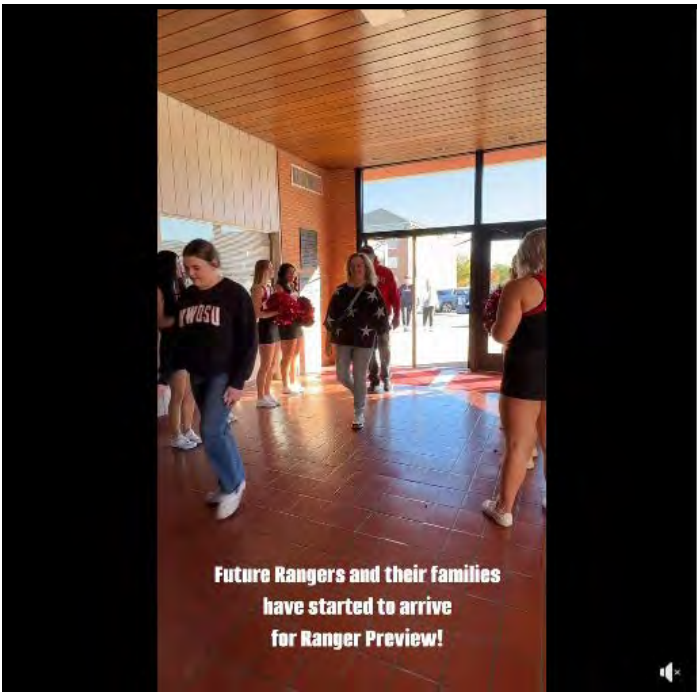
A grand opening ceremony is planned for early spring 2026 to celebrate the project’s completion.

The TSET Built Environment Grant program supports Oklahoma communities in creating healthier spaces that encourage physical activity and access to nutritious food. Funding is available for both planning and construction projects such as trails, parks, sidewalks and community gardens. All projects must be open to the public, based on local needs, and designed to improve long-term health outcomes for Oklahomans.

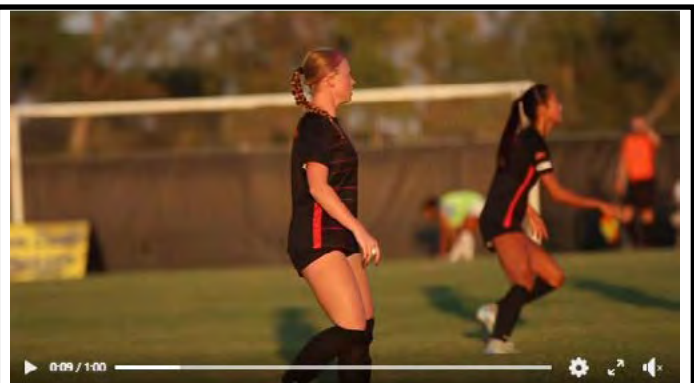

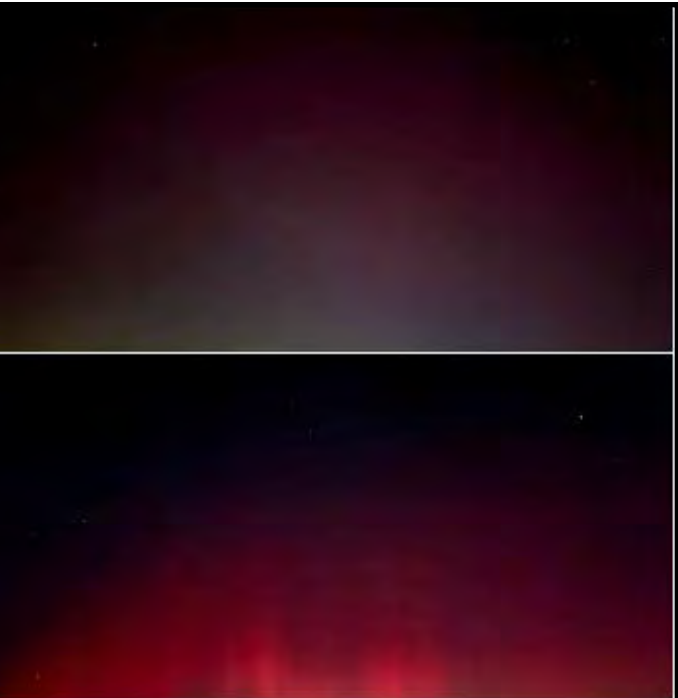

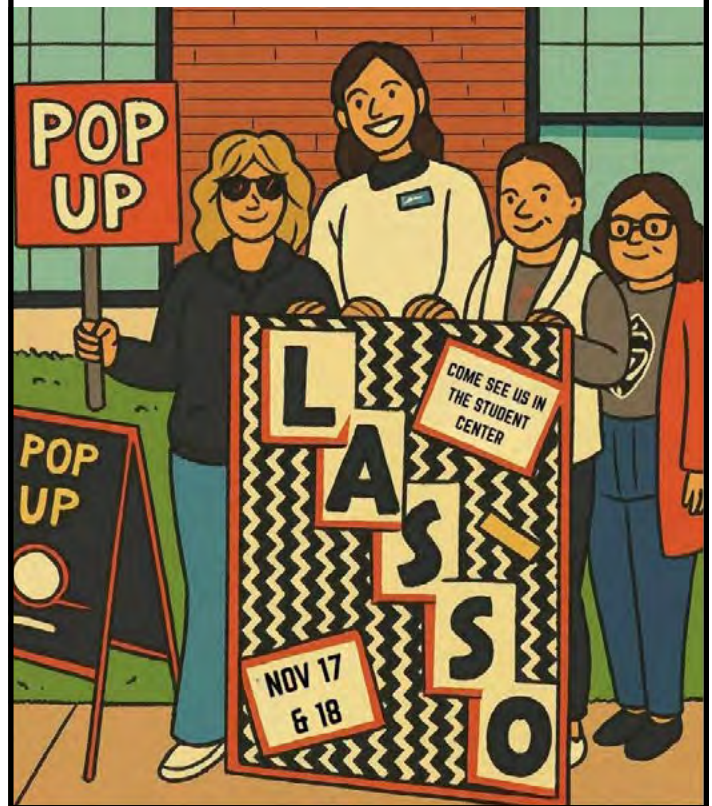

# Black Wall Street seminar presented on Enid Campus

A program on the Greenwood District's Black Wall Street area in Tulsa was given at the Northwestern's Enid campus Nov. 14, thanks to a free seminar offered by Teaching American History.

Northwestern's Department of Social Sciences played host to the program. Lunch was provided courtesy of Teaching American History.

"Our goal when hosting these professional development workshops is to bring opportunities to attend events conducted by national organizations to Northwest Oklahoma and Southern Kansas," said Jana Brown Pittman, instructor of history at Northwestern and organizer of the event. "We want to make the experience of gaining a deeper understanding of our history and government, as well as gathering resources for their classrooms more convenient for our educators."

The seminar, led by Dr. Donna Devlin, focused on Tulsa's Greenwood District, known as Black Wall Street, that developed in the midst of the Jim Crow Era following the American Civil War and during the early 20th century.

Devlin was raised on her family's farm near Jewell County, Kansas. She earned bachelor of arts and

education degrees from Fort Hays University in 2006, completed her Master of Arts in American History degree from Ashland University in Ashland, Ohio, in 2012 and finished her Doctorate of Philosophy in History from the University of Nebraska-Lincoln in 2023. Devlin served 11 years in the Kansas public school system teaching social studies and currently works as an assistant professor of history at Sterling College in Sterling, Kansas.

Teaching American History provides more than 150 one day seminars per year at no cost to the host or the teachers. The Nov. 14 program was conducted as a discussion, utilizing primary source documents as the only readings, with Devlin facilitating the conversation instead of lecturing

or presenting. Registrants will receive the readings prior to the seminar and are highly encouraged to read all the documents in advance and come ready with questions. Teachers will receive a letter of attendance at the conclusion of the seminar.

"Teaching about the Greenwood District's Black Wall Street is a requirement in the Oklahoma social studies standards for Oklahoma history," Pittman said. "However, the topic is also part of U.S. History and can serve as a case study for economic courses as well. This workshop will help teachers understand the history and gather primary source materials that they can use in lesson plans for U.S. history, Oklahoma history and even economics courses."

## Former Ranger quarterback delivers fall 2025 address

As a player for the Rangers, Dilbeck earned OIC Player of the

Week along with All Conference and All-Academic Team honors. In addition to his role on the football team, he was also a member of Phi Beta Lambda and the Fellowship of Christian Athletes.

Dilbeck earned two degrees from Northwestern, an educational foundation that has led to a career of over 25 years as a teacher, coach and administrator. He earned a Bachelor of Arts in Economics and Business Administration degree in 1991 and a Bachelor of Science in Elementary Education degree in 1994. He also served as the head coach for the Northwestern Men's and Women's track team in 1995.

Dilbeck graduated with a Master of Education in Education Leadership degree from Southwestern Oklahoma State University in 2010.

Dilbeck is originally from Pawhuska, which is where he currently resides, and serves as Executive Director of Activities and Athletics for Bartlesville Public Schools. He is also currently the secretary for the Oklahoma Frontier Valley Conference and serves on the board of Bartlesville Sports Commission. He is a member of the National Interscholastic Athletic Administrators Association, the Oklahoma Coaches Association and OIAAA.


Dilbeck is a trustee of the Northwestern Foundation and Alumni Association and a member of its governance committee.

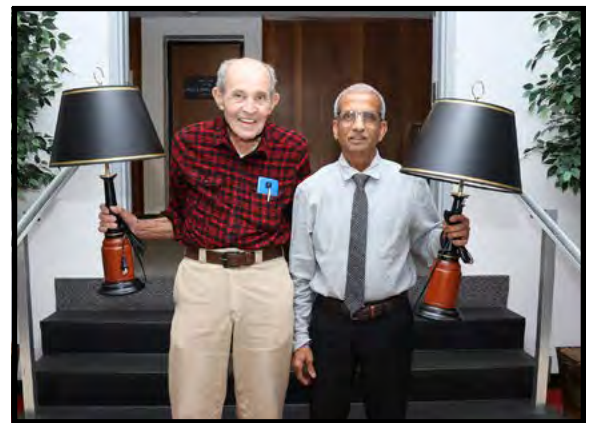

Reach Higher: RECONNECT events are a series of coordinated student recruitment opportunities to be held September through

December at participating Reach Higher campuses across the state. The primary goals of these events are to increase awareness of the adult-friendly degree completion options available through the Oklahoma State Regents for Higher Education’s Reach Higher initiative and encourage adults who have earned some college credit to successfully complete their degrees.

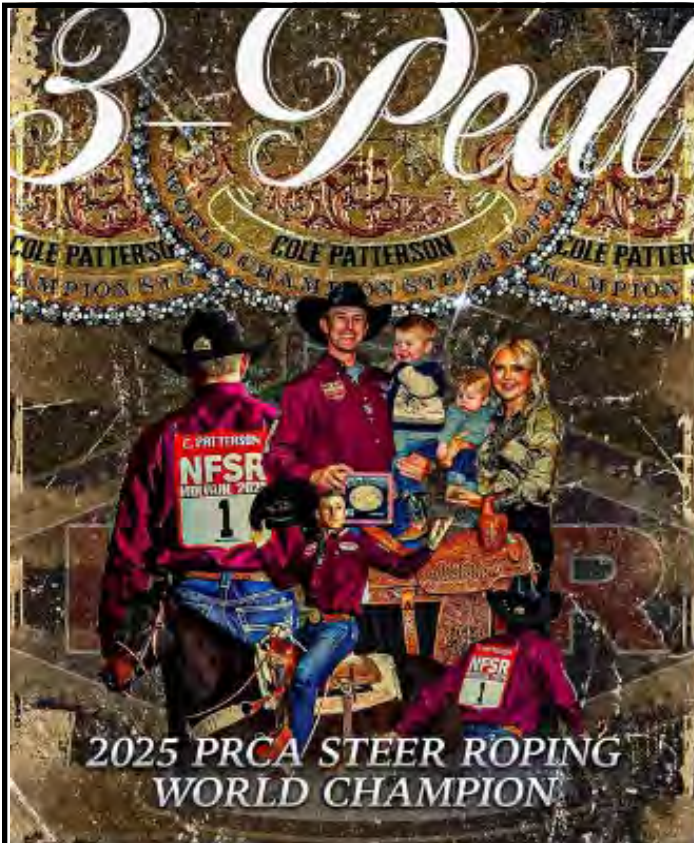
Hansen was nominated by Northwestern's President, Dr. Bo Hannaford, and GAC Commissioner Will Prewitt.

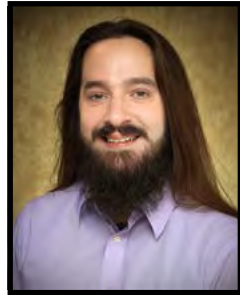
James Fanning, a senior social work major from Enid, is the recipient for this academic year.

CWPEP is a Title IV-E partnership between the University of Oklahoma, the Oklahoma Department of Human Services, the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services

Administration for Children and Families Council.

The University of Oklahoma manages the child welfare consortium with Northwestern along with East Central University and Oral Roberts University. Funding for the

educational program is provided by Title IV-E of the Social Security Act, called the Child Welfare Training Program.

"The social work program is proud to administer the CWPEP program and play an essential role in securing and retaining quality social workers in the public child welfare system," said Dr. Kylene Rehder, chair of the Northwestern Department of Social Work, professor of social work and CWPEP coordinator. "CWPEP at Northwestern has graduated 25 students, resulting in \$202,000 awarded in educational assistance."

# Franz named Fall 2025 ‘Teach Like a Ranger’ Honoree

Cecely Franz’s journey into teaching began long before she stepped into her first classroom.

“Ever since I was a little kid, I just wanted to be a teacher,” she recalls. “I played teacher, I played school.”

Growing up surrounded by family members who were educators, Franz found herself naturally drawn to the profession, inspired by the great teachers who shaped her own education.

A proud Northwestern Oklahoma State University alumna, she earned bachelor’s degrees in both Early Childhood Education and Elementary

Education in 2017, followed by her master’s degree in education as a Reading Specialist in 2019.

Today, Franz brings that lifelong passion to her kindergarten classroom at Washington Early Childhood Center (WECC) in Alva.

“From the moment Ms. Franz began teaching for me at Lincoln eight years ago, she’s been a star,” said Madison Williams, principal at Washington. “Her students don’t just learn; they belong. She has a way of making learning fun and engaging while still keeping up with the paperwork, committees, and extra duties that come her way.”

After spending eight years teaching fourth grade, Franz made

a bold move to teach kindergarten.

“I was ready for a change, ready to try something new,” Franz said. “I wouldn’t know if I liked something different if I didn’t step out of my comfort zone and try something different.”

The transition to kindergarten proved to be exactly what she needed.

“I ended up loving it, just like I loved fourth grade,” she said.

Williams said Franz’s transition went incredibly smoothly.

“For anyone walking into her classroom, it would be impossible to tell she’s new to kindergarten—

because she teaches with such natural grace and confidence,” Williams said. “She is always eager to learn and constantly seeks ways to grow.”

Franz’s classroom is filled with creative learning experiences, from guessing games to innovative uses of letter cards. When asked where she finds her inspiration, Franz is quick to credit her colleagues.

“My team is awesome,” Franz said. “They share so many different ideas and different things.”

She also draws inspiration from observing other educators, both in person and through social media platforms.

“I take a lot of influence from my team and other great teachers

that I see trying new things,” she said.

After watching a teacher play the game Hedbanz™ with students, Franz adapted the concept for her own letter recognition activities—demonstrating her ability to transform good ideas into practical classroom applications.

For first-year teachers, Franz offers grounded, practical advice.

“Ask for help when you need it,” she said. “Be willing to understand that things aren’t going to go the way that you expect the first time.”

She encourages new teachers to reflect on lessons that don’t go as planned and use those experiences to better meet their students’ needs.

To those considering the teaching profession, Franz’s message is clear: “Go for it.”

She recommends finding inspiring teachers to talk with, observing in various classrooms, and volunteering to gain experience with different grade levels.

“The more teachers that you see teaching, that’s how you get ideas, that’s how you feel comfortable being up in front of students,” Franz said.

Reflecting on her preparation for teaching, she credits her time at Northwestern as foundational to her success.

“I would not have been nearly as prepared for what I do as a teacher if it weren’t for the Northwestern education program and all the amazing teachers that I had,” Franz said.

Franz’s commitment to the teaching profession extends beyond her own classroom. For the past two summers, she has served as an adjunct instructor for the Northwest

ern Division of Education, teaching methods courses in the Para to Degree program.

By sharing her expertise and real-world classroom experience with aspiring teachers, Franz helps shape the next generation of educators while maintaining her connection to Northwestern.

“Cecely’s enthusiasm and passion for teaching inspire everyone around her,” said Dr. Jen Oswald, chair of the Northwestern Division of Education and associate professor of education, who had the privilege of teaching Franz during her time at Northwestern.

Franz embodies what it means to “Teach Like a Ranger”—bringing passion, innovation, collaboration, and a commitment to continuous growth to everything she does.

“She truly cares for her students, and that genuine love for others shines through in everything she does,” Oswald said. “We are incredibly proud of her and the remarkable career she is building.”

Oswald said Franz’s students are fortunate to learn from an educator who still carries the same enthusiasm for teaching that she had as a child playing school, now refined by years of experience and a dedication to ex-

cellence.

“Ms. Franz isn’t a great teacher simply because of experience,” Williams said. “She’s a great teacher because of the love, care, and dedication she models and builds every single day in her classroom. I am so very grateful to have her at Washington and proud to be her administrator.”

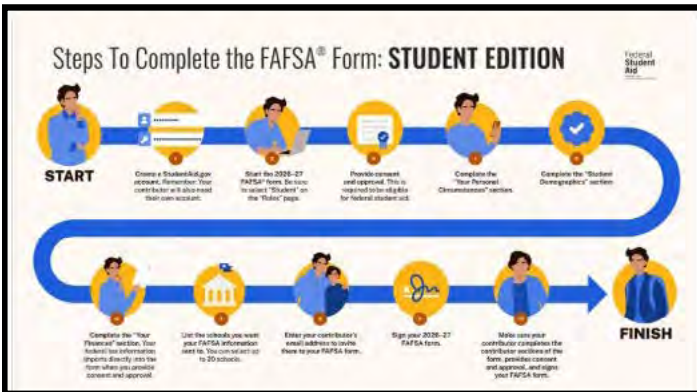

# Inaugural class of Reichenberger Legacy Scholars announced

The Department of Social Sciences is excited to announce the inaugural class of the Donovan Reichenberger Legacy Scholar Program.

The 2025-2026 class of Reichenberger Legacy Scholars are: Jacob Arnold, a junior history major from Enid; Ava Carr, a senior history major from Tuttle; Channing Dillinger, a freshman agriculture major from Hugoton, Kansas; and Keegan Logsdon, a sophomore political science major from Alva.

“We are proud to welcome these students as the Reichenberger Scholar inaugural class and look forward to working with them in the spring of 2026,” said Dr. Eric Schmaltz, Northwestern Department of Social Sciences chair and professor of history and global studies.

The program provides students with real-world exposure to ideas and concepts covered in traditional classroom study via travel and first-hand experience at historic sites. All travel expenses are covered by the Reichenberger Legacy Scholar Endowment.

For this initial installment of the Legacy Scholar Program, the theme of the program will be “Ancient America: Exploring America’s Pre-Columbian World.”

These four students will consider the

rise and fall of ancient American Indian civilizations by reading about and considering archaeological sites such as Spiro Mounds in eastern Oklahoma.

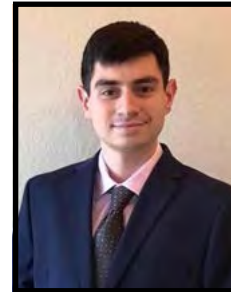
“I am honored to be one of the inaugural recipients,” Arnold said. “I am looking forward to enriching my knowledge of history.”

The trip for this session of the program is planned for Cahokia Mounds State Historic Site in Collinsville, Illinois, in April 2026.

# 7 Northwestern employees earn doctoral degrees

Seven Northwestern Oklahoma State University employees earned their doctoral degrees this past year.

They are: Melissa Brown, graduate studies enrollment and retention coordinator; Summer Foster, early childhood education program coordinator and instructor of education; Bailey Lancaster, assistant professor of psychology; Christopher Neu, instructor of psychology; Heidi Ritchie, assistant professor nursing; Derek Trabuc, instructor of education; and Olivia Yandel, director of the J.R. Holder Wellness Center.

## **Dr. Melissa Brown**

Brown graduated with her Doctor of Education in Leadership and Higher Education from St. Edward's University in Austin, Texas, on Dec. 12.

She is a Northwestern alumna, graduating with her Bachelor of Arts in History in 2017 and her Master of Education in Adult Education and Management in 2019.

"My degree and research contribute to Northwestern's success by supporting my current role as graduate enrollment and retention coordinator. This role ensures that our graduate students receive the necessary support to achieve their goals."

Her dissertation is titled, "Why We Stay, Why We Leave': Women's Voices in the M.Ed. Journey of Motivation and Persistence," examin-

ing the barriers to completion and motivational factors influencing persistence among women enrolled in the Master of Education program at a public regional university in the South-Central United States.

Findings revealed that participants frequently encountered challenges in balancing full-time employment, family obligations and financial pressures. Despite these barriers, intrinsic motivation, opportunities for professional advancement and strong support networks from family, peers and faculty were key factors promoting persistence and program completion.

The study's findings confirm the applicability of Vincent Tinto's theoretical framework to graduate education, highlighting that social and academic integration are crucial for student retention. Results underscore the importance of institutional efforts to enhance financial support, foster faculty engagement, and provide flexible program structures that accommodate nontraditional students.

"I am deeply grateful for the support I received at Northwestern, which has shaped my academic journey," Brown said. "I will continue to serve the university in various capacities, as well as conduct research in leadership, higher education, and retention."

## **Dr. Summer Foster**

Foster graduated with her Doctor of Education in Education Administration and Leadership from Southern Nazarene University on Dec. 6.

She also holds a Bachelor of Science in Elementary Education with an emphasis on Speech Language

Pathology from Fort Hays State University and a Master of Education in School Counseling from Southwestern Oklahoma State University.

Her dissertation is titled, "Exploring Educator's Experiences Implementing an Elementary Social-Emotional Curriculum: A Case Study."

This qualitative case study explored the experiences and perspectives of educators across two elementary schools regarding the Social and Emotional Learning (SEL) program implementation process.

Many schools nationwide have implemented SEL programs, recognizing the vital role schools play in supporting children and the im-

portance of social-emotional skills for learning. Schools invest resources in SEL to boost student well-being and academic achievement. While SEL programs are designed to build student resilience, implementation success varies among schools. The findings showed that while educators highly value SEL, their

enthusiasm alone is not enough for successful school-wide change.

Four main themes emerged: SEL

is complex; educators are driven by necessity; there is a disconnect between school goals and outside realities; and missing components prevent transformation. These systemic deficiencies were found to prevent a successful complex change, even when educators had high motivation and consensus for the initiative.

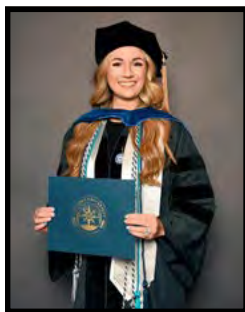
“I will use my degree to equip my future educators with evidence-based SEL models to effectively manage classrooms and teach their future students the durable skills of resilience, collaboration and self-management necessary for success in society and employment,” Foster said.

### **Dr. Bailey Lancaster**

Lancaster earned her Doctor of General Psychology with an emphasis in Performance Psychology from National University in July.

She is also a Northwestern alumna, graduating with a Bachelor of Science in Health and Sports Science Education in 2015 and a Master of Counseling Psychology in 2017.

“This doctoral degree has expanded my ability to connect performance psychology with counselor

wellness, particularly in addressing burnout,” Lancaster said. “The mental health crisis in Oklahoma, the U.S. and worldwide demands counselors who are not only clinically skilled but personally resilient. By integrating recovery science and performance research into counselor training, I help graduate students understand that sustainable practice depends on maintaining their own mental and physical health through rest, balance, and boundaries.”

Her dissertation is titled, “Managing Midnight Miles: A Qualitative Descriptive Single-Case Study on Sleep Strategies Among United States Ultra-Marathon Runners.”

This qualitative descriptive single-case study explored how U.S. ultra-marathon runners perceive the role of sleep and sleep insufficiency in their physical, psychological and social well-being.

Fifteen participants completed semi-structured virtual interviews and the findings revealed nine major themes related to how athletes optimize recovery, regulate emotions and maintain performance despite chronic fatigue and life demands.

Guided by the biopsychosocial model, the research demonstrated that high performers - whether athletes, counselors or educators - face similar challenges: balancing recovery, relationships and identity under sustained pressure.

“As a counselor, educator, mother and wife, I’ve seen firsthand how easy it is to neglect rest and recovery in the service of others,” Lancaster said. “My research helped me understand that we can’t pour from an empty cup. Counselors must prioritize boundaries, rest, and recovery

to reduce burnout and sustainably support others.”

According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention in 2023, nearly one in three adults in the U.S. do not get the sleep they need, a statistic that deeply resonates with those in the helping professions.

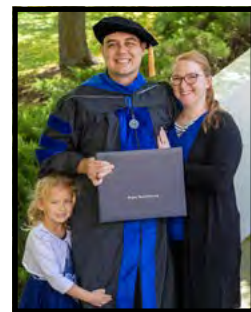
“Sleep isn’t just a biological need—it’s an ethical responsibility for those in helping professions,” Lancaster said. “If we want to address the mental health crisis, we must start by ensuring the well-being of the professionals serving others.”

### **Dr. Christopher Neu**

Neu graduated with his Doctor of Philosophy in Marriage and Family Therapy from Brigham Young University this December.

He previously earned a Bachelor of Science in Family Studies from Brigham Young in April 2018 and graduated with a Master of Science in Marriage and Family Therapy from the University of Nebraska-Lincoln in December 2021.

“My doctoral degree emphasizes advanced systemic theory, outcome and process research, and statistics, which strengthens my ability to help all of our students at Northwestern see how rigorous inquiry can explain and improve relational and

psychological processes,” Neu said. “I want students to engage directly with research by asking meaningful questions, working with data, and connecting findings to everyday problems so they can appreciate how evidence, not opinion, should guide practice and policy.”

His dissertation is titled, “Physiological Activation Patterns of a Neurodiverse Couple in Relational Therapy.”

This four-session clinical study investigated the connection between Attention Deficit/Hyperactivity Disorder (ADHD) status and autonomic responses to negative facial expressions from partners and therapists in couple therapy.

Research on ADHD individuals in romantic relationships suggests significant relational dissatisfaction. Polyvagal theory explains these challenges, and predicts decreased parasympathetic nervous system (PNS) activation and increased sympathetic nervous system (SNS) activation in response to threats. Because ADHD is characterized by emotion dysregulation and rejection sensitivity, relational challenges may stem from elevated SNS and dampened PNS activity.

Using a single-case design, physiologic markers of SNS activity and PNS activity were examined. The findings support that ADHD-related regulatory challenges may interfere with the couple therapy process.

Neu said this degree supports his goal of creating a learning environment where majors in psychology, counseling and related fields become confident, research-informed

thinkers who use data and theory to understand people, relationships and systems in ethically responsible ways.

### *Dr. Heidi Ritchie*

Ritchie graduated with her Doctor of Philosophy in Nursing Education from the University of Northern Colorado in May.

She previously earned a diploma in Nursing from Bryan Memorial Hospital in Lincoln, Nebraska, in 1996. She then went on to earn a Bachelor of Science in Nursing from Nebraska Wesleyan University in 1998 and a Master of Science with emphasis in Nursing Education from the University of Northern Colorado in 2003.

“As a registered nurse with almost 30 years of clinical experience, I believe it is vital that we continue to improve nursing education,” Ritchie said. “Further research here in Oklahoma is needed to help us understand how to best prepare our nursing students to thrive and continue to be leaders in clinical practice.”

Her dissertation is titled, “Exploration of Disorienting Dilemmas New Registered Nurses Experience in Clinical Situations.”

Eighteen new graduate Registered Nurses from the United States with greater than six months and

less than two years of experience were interviewed. By initial and focused coding, five concepts were identified. Based upon these five concepts, a theoretical model was developed to represent the experience new graduate registered nurses described when confronted with a disorienting dilemma.

Findings indicate that disorienting dilemmas were “red stop light” experiences for 13 of these new registered nurses. The disorienting dilemma caused them to stop, assess the situation and then decide how to proceed.

When new graduate Registered Nurses perceived they were able to successfully navigate the disorienting dilemma and resolve the situation, they were able to see it as a growth process. However, some were unable to resolve the disorienting dilemma and left bedside clinical practice, changed from night shift to day shift, moved from full-time to part-time, or refused to work with other registered nurses due to the outcome of the dilemma.

“My goal is to conduct further research studies regarding disorienting dilemmas to examine their impact on all clinical nurses as a means to improve nurse retention at the bedside and improve clinical practice,” Ritchie said. “This research will be used to help bridge the gap between nursing education and practice.”

Ritchie plans to develop tools and simulation experiences to assist nursing students with understanding the dilemmas they may encounter in practice and learn how to suc-

successfully navigate them.

### **Dr. Derek Trabuc**

Trabuc graduated with his Doctor of Education in Curriculum and Instruction from the American College of Education in Indianapolis, Indiana, this December.

He holds two degrees from Pittsburg State University in Pittsburg, Kansas, including a Bachelor of Science in Elementary Education, which he received in May 2004, and a Master of Science in Educational Leadership, which he received in December 2009.

His dissertation is titled, "Inclusion of Autistic Students and Educator Preparation: Qualitative Case Study," a descriptive case study to identify the perceptions of educators when instructing students with autism in the general education classroom.

"This degree helps me provide future teachers with new and practical knowledge to help them be successful in a diverse classroom," Trabuc said.

### **Dr. Olivia Yandel**

Yandel graduated with her Doctor of Education in Administration and Leadership from Southern Nazarene University on Dec. 6.

Yandel is a Northwestern alumna, graduating with a Bachelor of Science in Health and Sports Science in 2014 and a Master's in Adult Education and Sports Administration in 2016.

Her dissertation is titled, "The

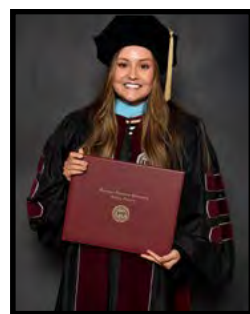
Impact of Student Engagement in First-Year College Students: A Case Study."

The findings from this qualitative case study have highlighted how multidimensional student engagement can be and the role student engagement plays in shaping first-year students' personal trajectories.

The research identified that student engagement is not a one-size-fits-all approach, and there appears to be a disconnect between students and institutions on what defines student engagement.

Additionally, the findings of this study confirm that social media serves as a primary channel for student engagement information. The participants rely heavily on friends' invitations and digital platforms as primary ways to decide to participate in events. Institutions can no longer rely solely on traditional communication channels to promote their student engagement opportunities.

However, to effectively foster

engagement, universities must strategically utilize digital platforms to meet students where they are. Institutions should intentionally cultivate and utilize positive peer-to-peer influence and construct ways to build a sense of belonging amongst first-year students. A student's emotional well-being is vital in the first year and

student engagement can be greatly impacted by this.

Finally, the importance of student engagement is not merely an outcome, it is a catalyst that propels personal development within first-year students. When universities create a culture of belonging, engagement naturally follows.

"I performed my study at a small, public four-year university and found the findings to be extremely beneficial to the future of student engagement at colleges like Northwestern," Yandel said. "With the information from this study, universities can better serve the first-year student population by identifying the needs and desires of these students. We can find ways to increase engagement across the board, but also assist with increasing retention rates, thus leading to higher graduation rates from these students."

The study found the importance of informal support networks, such as the relationships and trust built between students and their peers, faculty and staff, therefore universities have the capability to use this information to cultivate a culture of acceptance and belonging.

"For me, this study was extremely eye-opening to the importance of building camaraderie on our campus," Yandel said. "As the wellness center director and lecturer, I take for granted the chances to connect with students on a personal level. I hope to be more mindful about reaching out to students and connecting with them, not just on a professional level, but on a personal level as well."

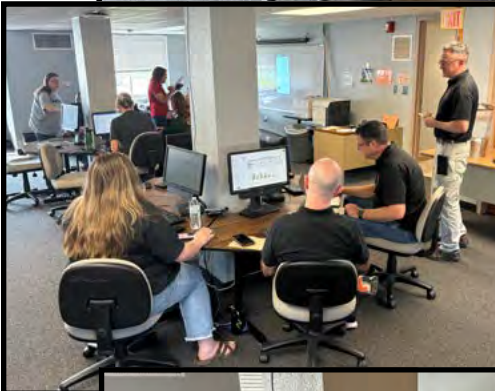
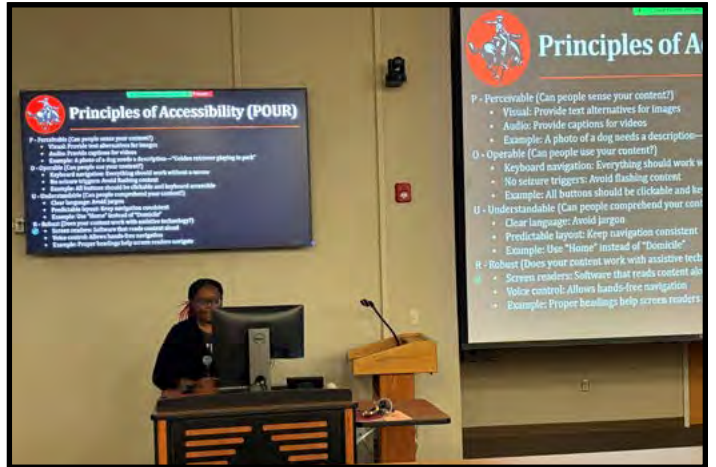
