Based on 2016 Student Data: First Generation Students=390

- These were first time, full-time, degree seeking students. Of these 390 students, 368 were awarded one or more of the following financial assistance sources:
- Federal Work Study
- Student Loans
- Pell Grants
- Other Grants, Loans, and Scholarships
- This is well over half of the Freshmen Class. These students have very little financial support to attend college. These are students from families with little to no knowledge of the costs of college attendance. It is likely that these families do not understand what constitutes "fees", what constitutes "tuition", or what books cost!
